Loopholes Could Stymie New Judiciary's Power

ed a judicial group that serves more than just a decorative purpose.

proved an amendment to the Student Gov. ernment Constitution that gives the All-University Judiciary more power and authority than it has ever half.

The State News has supported the amendment, realizing the former judicial organization was practically useless.

the new amendment.

First is a clause in the section discussing the Judiciary's powers. It reads: "A student may submit in writing-immediately, to the Dean of Student's, a request that his case not be handled by the All-University Judiciary."

This clause is paradoxical. It implies that any student for any reason can sidestep the Judiciary and have the Dean of Students adjudicate his case—precisely what was wrong with the former judicial organnation. In the past, students having a choice of judges, invariably, for one reason or another, chose to have their cases disposed of by the Dean Judiciary members found themselves with a fancy title and

The soon to be appointed justices of the new Judiciary, if they desire to perfect a smooth-running, effective organizationan organization that will be continually used by students having disciplinary problems-should make certain this "loophole clause" is removed at the earliest possible

Second flaw in the judicial amendment reads: "Hearings involving student infractions of university regulations or publaws shall not be open to the public

eminently unfair to the accused. We believe every accused student should have the right of deciding himself whether he wants the public admitted to his hearing.

Why should an accused student be forced to sit in a room with only himself, his counsel and nine justices present? Practically every student facing a hearing before the Judiciary will have friends who will be extremely interested in the hear-

This not the age of the Inquisition. Judiciary hearings should not be secret. There is no good reason why the public should not be admitted to every hearing if the accused so desires.

Another clause that bothers us though we don't yet consider it a flaw, is this: "The All-University Judiciary's decisions shall be considered final unless they are changed by the Dean of Students or appealed to him."

At the present time this implied re-viewing of all the Judiciary's decisions by the Dean of Students is perhaps necessary. The group is new and has not yet had an opportunity to prove itself.

However, the fact that the Dean of Students can upset any of the Judiciary's decisions, even when they are not appealed, will detract from the latter's authority and

We believe that a close watch should be kept by student justices themselves and by Student Government officials on how many decisions are upset by the Dean of Students.

If experience shows the Judiciary is doing a competent job, the Dean of Stu-dents should be deprived of the right to change Judiciary decisions, unless the accused specifically requests his review

The professor began with the usual remarks about the course number, name of textbook and office hours. Then he told us that, he believed in running his class in a democratic way.

Running a class democratically means, I think, that the students have a right to voice

In Africa, Rhodesia and Nyasaland were given an indepen-dent federal status in 1952; Nigeria is at present in the pro-cess of becoming an Independent dominion, a process due to be completed by the end of of this year: Sudan, formerly a joint protectorate is now an in-dependent country; the Gold Coast government led by Dr. Nkrumah has accepted the Brit-ish proposals as a further step toward independence.

At a conference held in Lon-don in February of this year, British and Somali officials con-ferred on various measures de-

signed to bring about the event-ual independence of Somaliland. Furthermore, Malaya has been-promised complete indepen-dence by August 1957 and the British West Indies have re-cently become an independent federal seneral election will not federal general election will not be held until 1958.

I quote these as recent examples of British colonial policy, a policy you describe as "an antiquated colonial policy back-up by force," a policy of "inflexible intolerance."
