Congress Charged Inefficient

Miss Moynihan Submits Letter

A written statement by Pat Moynihan, organizations chairman, presented at the first spring term Congress session Wednesday, charged that inefficiency and lack of organization in Student Government left six campus groups without temporary charters today.

Six bills requesting temporary charters were introduced at the Congress meeting of Wednesday and were to be voted on last night.

Miss Moynihan, East Lansing, pointed out in her statement that the organizations committee was unable to perform its duty of investigating bills concerning organizations and their applications for temporary or permanent charters.

"Committee meetings were called and members present, only to find that there were no constitutions or charter forms to be found in the entire government office," the report read.

The six organizations who have petitioned for temporary charters are the Trowel Club, Kappa Alpha Psi, the Rifle Club (women's), Industrial Education Association Club and the Education Council. Miss Moynihan also related how the committee attempted to remedy the situation so the clubs could be granted charters. A suggestion that letters be written to these organizations explaining forms must be filled out and constitutions submitted to the committee was impossible, she said.

The committee was stopped when it was unable to locate a list of the members and therefore did not know a single member of a club seeking charters," said Miss Moynihan.

The views expressed in the written statement were those of the entire organizations committee, according to Miss Moynihan. Congress also received and approved a written resignation from Miss Moynihan, who stated she could not be able to attend to congressional duties because of another meeting scheduled for the night of Congress.

Diane Boersma, speaker, intimated that the information needed for these organization's charters would be found or replaced if they could be brought before Congress next week for approval.

4 Bills Introduced At Wednesday's Congress Meeting

Four bills were introduced and the resolution was passed at the Congress meeting Wednesday.

The bills which will be submitted for approval at the next session April 18 include:

1. A \$4,000 budget for spring.
 2. The transfer of \$352 from the Olympic Fund to the Spartans Night telethon fund. This money was collected by student members at the MSU-Illinois basketball game winter term.
 3. The extension of the due date to November 30 for \$175 loan Alpha Epsilon Rho.
 4. The revision of the Frosh-Council constitution.
- A resolution to place park benches around the campus for enjoyment and comfort of students and faculty was adopted. This resolution will be referred to the campus department of buildings and maintenance.

Ike Outruns Adlai, But Race Is Close

CHICAGO (AP) — President Eisenhower drew more votes than Adlai E. Stevenson in Wednesday's presidential preference primary in Illinois. The race was very, very close—and the result probably caused more concern than celebration.

Gov. William G. Stratton earned the Republican nomination for a second term easily. Herbert C. Paschen took the Democratic nomination without much trouble.

On the Republican preference ballot was Sen. William F. Knowland of California, who is supporting the President for a second term, and Lar Daly, a Chicagoan who has made several unsuccessful bids for public office.

Stevenson appeared alone on the Democratic ballot in his home state. Sen. Estes Kefauver, who was not listed on the ballot and who did not campaign in Illinois, received write-in votes. But his total fell far under the goal of his backers—10 per cent of the Stevenson total.

Truman Calls Ike 'Do-Nothing President'

DES MOINES (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman, who has often expressed his sympathy for his successor, turned on President Eisenhower in a political speech Wednesday night and called him a "do-nothing President."

Truman declared that "with presidential leadership, we could have a good farm program." Instead, he added, a Democratic Congress has been trying to help the farmer while "the President has been putting road blocks in the way."

Stevenson Attacks Middle East Policy

Skating, Marriage Go Together Like . . .

There's a guy named Jamie Lawrence who may be just the thing for the 1972 squad. Check on him.

Why 1972? Because Jamie is only two years old at present. Why might he be just the thing for the team? Because Jamie is the son of Jimmy Lawrence, the two stars of "Ice Capades," currently appearing at the Ice Arena.

Although Lawrence insists he won't coax his son to do ice skating, if young Jamie should, he'll have two of the finest coaches in the country.

For Lawrence and his wife are two fine skaters.

Interviewed prior to Tuesday night's performance, the two smilingly told how much skating has meant to them and how much their marriage has helped their career.

Margaret and Jimmy were married in 1949, shortly after they took their current starring roles in "Ice Capades." Jimmy had just returned to the show after three years in college while Margaret had recently joined the show.

Jimmy began his skating career at five. Ten years later he turned professional. His father wasn't too happy with the idea, Jimmy said, because he wanted him to get a college degree.

But the offers increased and finally Jimmy and his father made an agreement. He could turn professional at 15 if, after three years, he would interrupt his career and attend college.

Jimmy kept his promise and went to Macalester College in St. Paul, Minn., his home town.

Miss Field began her skating career at 10 and turned professional at 17. While an amateur, she had won the California State and the Pacific Coast championships. Margaret also placed third in the Nationals as did Jimmy.

Although they've both been pros for more than 10 years, they still practice all the time. Before each show, both Margaret and Jimmy do exercises

similar to those of a ballet dancer in their dressing rooms to loosen their muscles. Even when vacationing at their California home in the summer, the pair are constantly working on new routines and practicing the old ones.

Both Jimmy and Margaret said their biggest thrill in skating was performing in London in the summers of 1949 and 1950. They met many dignitaries and were received very well there, they said.

When asked who they consider to be some of the better skaters, past and present, Margaret quickly answered.

"There's no doubt that Sonja Henie is one of the finest and has done more for ice skating than any other individual."

House Vote Of 237-181 Passes Bill

Ike's Program Plowed Under

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House plowed under the Eisenhower farm program Wednesday, voting 237-181 in favor of a bill which would give farmers nearly three billion dollars in new benefits this election year.

Disregarding grim predictions of a veto, the House accepted compromise legislation worked out by a congressional conference committee and sent the big bill to the Senate for the final action.

It was one of the worst legislative defeats suffered by President Eisenhower since he took office.

The key test came on a motion to send the bill back to the conference committee for a major overhaul. The motion was defeated on a rollcall vote of 236-181.

Republicans broke ranks under election-year pressure from the farm belt and 27 voted against the administration on the test. The Michigan vote was: Democrats for—Diggs, Dingell, Griffiths, Hayworth, Lesinski, MacBroom, Babaut, Republican against—Bentley, Cederberg, Dondero, Ford, Hoffman, Johnson, Knox, Meader, Thompson, Wolcott.

Williams Opposes 'Casual and Easy' Traffic Judges

Gov. Williams said Wednesday that judges who give a traffic offender "casual and easy" treatment in court lose an opportunity to contribute to highway safety.

In a speech prepared for the fourth annual Traffic Court Conference at Michigan State, the Governor referred to a 10-point program adopted a year ago by the executive committee of the Michigan Association of Municipal Judges for dealing with the convicted traffic violator.

He noted its great emphasis was on educating the errant driver.

"It cannot help but follow when the courts are a leading force in emphasizing the evil of the traffic violator that the community attitude toward the bad driver will be more severe," Williams said.

Secret Inquiry in Progress

Marine Drill Sergeant Given Psychiatric Exam

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C. (AP) — A drill sergeant who ordered a forced march that resulted in the drowning of six Marine recruits has been given a psychiatric examination, his commanding general reported Wednesday.

Major Gen. Joseph C. Burger, Parris Island base commander, ordered the examination Monday night, the day after S. Sgt. Matthew C. McKee, 31, of Worcester, Mass., led the party of 78 recruits into a treacherous tidal stream to teach them discipline.

The examination was made by the Navy Medical Corps psychiatric department. They would not divulge results of the examination.

A board of inquiry is underway on orders of Gen. Randolph McCall Pate, Marine Corps commandant.

Burger appeared at a press conference during a break in the closed door meeting of the court of inquiry, which is painstakingly piecing together details of the tragic Sunday night death march.

Survivors of the march, many still appearing dazed by their brush with death, went before the court to tell what happened. Their testimony was not disclosed.

Burger said the court is not expected to complete its investigation before the end of the week.

Its report will be forwarded to Corps headquarters in Washington.

Both Gen. Burger and Gen. Pate said McKee had no authority to order such a march or to take disciplinary action.

Late Registration Brings Student Total to 16,111

Official enrollment this term, including late registration, is the highest ever recorded for spring quarter.

At the end of registration last Wednesday, April 4, 15,964 registrants had been recorded. Late registrations jumped the total to 16,111.

This is the largest gain of any term on record percentage-wise and officials feel there is a definite trend toward great enrollment increases in the future.

It is felt that by 1960 the population at State will be well over 20,000.

Before late registration figures were announced the men outnumbered the coeds by 2-1. There were 10,963 men to 5,002 coeds. Of the men 3,215 were recorded as being veterans.

Birmingham Police Say Cole Attack Was Planned

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — The attack by more than 100 white men on Negro singer Nat King Cole Tuesday was planned, police said.

Cole, who is to appear as a featured singer in the Record Star Parade in the Aud. April 23, was assaulted as he sang before nearly 4,000 persons.

Investigating officers said they had determined that Tuesday's attack, in which six men were arrested, had been planned four days ago at a filling station owned by one of the men from Anniston, Ala.

Officers said they had learned that a mob expected to total 150 men from Anniston, Piedmont, Birmingham, Tuscaloosa and the Birmingham area was to join at the auditorium.

"Our information is that they had planned to infiltrate the audience, overpower the band, the police, and anyone else who interfered with them," said Golden. "But the expected mob failed to show."

Cole Wednesday canceled three Southern appearances following the attack. "The 37-year-old Alabama-born entertainer said, however, that he hopes to sing again in his native state."

The incident occurred three days after a group of White Citizens Councils launched a campaign against "Negro music" and before here, Cole doesn't emphasize that type of song.

Asa E. Carter, executive secretary of the North Alabama White Citizens Council, denied that his organization had anything to do with the attack.

New Rules Set By Co-op Council At First Meeting

The new executive staff of the men's Intercooperative Council, elected last term, have been initiated into their new posts.

The position of president will be filled by Jim Voorhees of Holland House.

Other officers are vice president, Jim Keel, Holland House; secretary, Bob Christensen, Elsworth House and treasurer, Gaylord Denlow, Motts House.

At the council's bi-weekly meeting it was decided that the council would initiate a dorm-type contract for men entering the co-ops. This, Voorhees said, would insure members remaining in the houses for as long as their contract stipulated.

Also reported was that for the first time council members have been extended a formal invitation for the rushing now in progress.

Farmers Get Extra \$3 Billion

Many Republicans See Ike Veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress passed its battle-scarred farm bill Wednesday night, handing President Eisenhower one of the worst legislative defeats since he entered the White House.

The election-year measure of farm benefits, an extra three billion dollars in benefits during this growing season, including high rigid price supports which Eisenhower opposes.

Many Republican leaders in Congress predicted the President will veto the legislation. Democrats and farm belt Republicans were equally confident he would sign it, some saying he had no other course.

Action on the controversial bill was completed by the Senate, after the House passed it 237-181 earlier in the day. The Senate rollcall vote on passage was 50-23.

As approved by Congress, the bill virtually plows under much of the Eisenhower agricultural program.

It gives the President the tool he has long wanted to cut down the production of surplus crops, but it scraps the flexible price support system he fought for and won after a congressional battle two years ago.

After the earlier House vote, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the President "still does not think the bill meets the test of a good bill."

Just before the senate vote, Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), senior GOP member of the Agriculture Committee, said the bill was "totally unacceptable to the administration" and urged his colleagues to vote against it.

He indicated he expected Eisenhower to veto it.

Michigan's two senators split in the voting on the bill. Democrat Patrick McNamara voted for the bill while Republican Charles Potter voted against it.

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld met Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and other top Egyptian officials Wednesday to urge Arab-Israeli peace.

Wednesday night there were new reports of Arab violence in Israel after a lull.

At the first All-Union Board meeting tonight, in Old College Hall at 8:30, 56 new Union Board members will be assigned to committees and introduced to their committee chairmen.

Israel announced Arab commandos struck again Wednesday night in a series of raids near Tel Aviv killing three while at evening prayers in a synagogue, the Israeli army said.

Fifteen other persons were reported injured.

An Israel Foreign Ministry official in Jerusalem said the "conclusion is inescapable that Egypt has dispatched new forces to engage in murder and sabotage inside Israel."

Wednesday night's toll raised the total Israeli casualties in the current rash of commando attacks to 13 dead and 51 wounded.

Hammarskjöld presented his plea in a 75-minute conference with Nasser. The Premier, in turn, explained Egypt's views.

In Tel Aviv, Israel's Premier David Ben-Gurion met with the Security and Foreign Affairs committees of his Parliament for a discussion of recent developments and the Hammarskjöld mission.

Hammarskjöld is due there next Monday.

BERLIN (AP) — A school teacher in Communist East Germany has been sentenced to eight years in jail for taking his pupils to Allied West Berlin and showing them the well-filled stores.

An East German newspaper reported Wednesday that the teacher, Hubert Mankin, took 29 pupils into numerous West Berlin stores, where he was alleged to have made anti-Communist remarks.

The library has been placed under special surveillance because failure to comply with the new regulations has resulted in damage to the new building.

The smoking ordinance, passed by the State Board of Agriculture, will go into effect April 20. Summonses will be issued and violators will be required to appear in justice court in Lansing.

Written warnings will be issued in the library until April 20. After two days of patrolling no violators have been reported.

Administrators selected from the library staff are helping police the building but will not be able to issue summonses. However, the Department of Public Safety will issue summonses to violators on the basis of information submitted by the staff members.

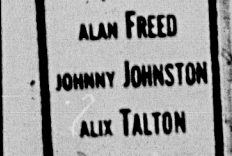

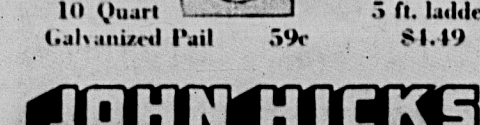

In all other frames the Spartans had at least two men on base. State left nine on base.

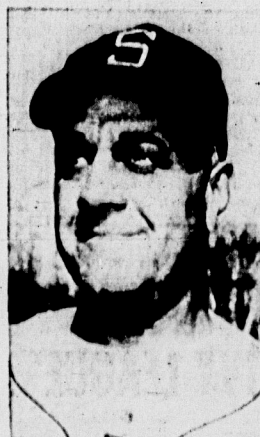
State had somewhat of an advantage due to its nine-game winning record which produced a 4-1 record.

Red Wings Contemplate Next Year

DETROIT (AP) — With their proudest possession, the Stanley Cup, left behind in Montreal, the Detroit Red Wings arrived back home Wednesday and immediately gave vent to the old rallying cry of "wait till next year."

The Wings, National Hockey League champions for the past seven years, and defending Stanley Cup champs, lost both titles this year to the arch-enemy, Montreal Canadiens.

The final blow came at Montreal's forum Tuesday when the Canadiens, cheered on by a full house of rabid fans, whipped Detroit 3-1 for their fourth victory against a lone defeat in the playoff finals.

General Jack Adams, veteran of 39 years in big-time hockey, started making plans for the 1966-67 edition of the Wings almost as soon as the final buzzer sounded.

Proud of his boys even in defeat, Adams said Detroit frankly expected to win last night's game and bring the series back to Detroit.

"We did all we could," he said, "but what could we expect when we had six men hurt, two of them missing entirely and four others at half strength?"

Detroit will be without the services of the "old pro" Bob Goldhamer next year. Goldhamer, now 44, has decided to end a national hockey league career that started in 1941 and retire.

Adams has offered him the job of coaching the Wings' junior farm club at Hamilton, Ont.

Landy Cleared to Run in U. S.

NEW YORK (AP) — A slight hitch developed Wednesday in John Landy's plans to run in the United States next month, but the red tape quickly was cleared for the first start of the world's fastest runner in this country.

Shortly after the news came out of the Pacific Coast that the lanky Australian school teacher would compete at Los Angeles May 3 and at Fresno, Calif., May 12, the Amateur Athletic Union in New York threw up a "stop" sign.

"We have not issued an invitation for such a visit," Don Ferris, secretary-treasurer of the AAU, said. "These things have to be done through channels."

Furthermore, the Fresno meet hasn't received the sanction of the AAU.

Ferris added that it was a breach of international amateur rules to issue a private invitation to a foreign athlete.

"If the request is made properly through the district associations, I think everything can be worked out satisfactorily," Ferris added.

Meanwhile, the Central California Assn. of the AAU acted quickly to give the Fresno West Coast relay 1956 sanction. St. Tyler, president of the association, said there should be no trouble getting Landy to run at Fresno.

Landy said yesterday that if conditions are favorable he may give America its first four-minute mile.

In Melbourne, Landy, who has run the mile under four minutes in four of his last five races, and whose 4:38 is the fastest on record, said, "If there is any doubt about my status for running in America, next month I definitely will not be a starter."

In Fresno, J. Flint Hammer, director of the West Coast Relays, said he would take immediate steps to get his meet properly sanctioned and Landy's appearance approved.

The rhubarb developed after Pote Rozelle, an airlines public relations official who is helping promote the Melbourne Olympic Games, phoned Ferris Tuesday advising him that Landy was being invited for the two meets.

Poly Sci Grad Students Join Fall Election Fight

As Republicans and Democrats are taking off their glasses for the fall election fight, four graduate students in political science are stepping into the middle of the fray.

Five-four, all fellowship students working on their Ph.D.s, are serving in the Michigan headquarters of the major political parties in Lansing.

William Rhode, East Lansing, is working on the staff of the Democratic State Central Committee. Serving with the Republican State Central Committee are Roland Ebel, Glen Ellyn, Ill.; William Maxam, Francisco, Ind.; and Emanuel Colotti, Springfield, Mass.

It's part of the men's study of political parties and interest groups, said Dr. Norton F. Long, professor of political science and director of the program.

They will do research and write, work helping the parties develop ammunition for the coming campaign. Their jobs will give them a chance to observe and participate in practical politics.

Presidential Succession Suggested by Hoover

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former President Hoover sent Congress a telegram Wednesday suggesting ways to assign presidential powers if a chief executive became incapacitated.

Hoover told a House Judiciary subcommittee he believes the Cabinet should decide when the duties of a sidelined president should be taken over temporarily by the vice president.

Such a system, he said, would give assurances that executive responsibility would remain with the party holding the White House.

The subcommittee is studying various proposals to spell out what action should be taken if a president became too ill to carry out his functions or was otherwise incapacitated, if only temporarily.

The Constitution's provisions on this subject are vague and no vice president ever has taken over except in case of a president's death.

To further insure a continuity of White House policy, Hoover suggested that Cabinet members, rather than the speaker of the House and president pro tempore of the Senate, follow

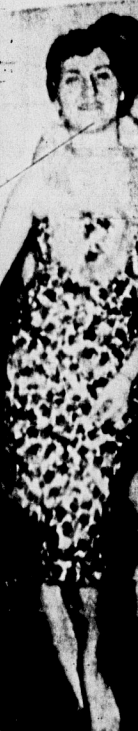
