## Phi Beta Kappa Chapter Remains A Future Hope

A question that often crops up at bull sessions and coffee klatsches is "Why isn't there a Phi Beta Kappa chapter at

It's a natural question. Phi Beta Kappa, oldest and most renowned of all Greek-letter fraternities in the U.S., carries with it a century and a half of scholarly tradition and prestige

Most students know that Phi Beta Kapis an honorary organization whose membership is limited to the most outstanding students at a university. They also know it to be a society with the highest academic standards.

The absence of a chapter at one of the nation's largest universities, then, offers plenty of room for conjecture.

Rumors have had it that MSU's educaonal standards are not high enough for Phi Beta Kappa; that it does not have enough faculty members with Ph. D. degrees; that it lacks suitable library facilities, and that it is deficient in a dozen other respects

It's pointed out that Phi Beta Kappa has installed chapters at three other schools in the state; the U of M, Wayne University,

and Albion College.

Efforts have been made in the past, and still being made to get an undergradnate Phi Beta Kappa chapter here. These efforts are being spearheaded by a group of faculty members who are themselves members of the fraternity.

Once every three years, the national Phi Beta Kappa organization announces the colleges and universities where it will install new chapters. It last did this in the

At that time, MSU was asked by the committee investigating new chapters to postpone its bid for a chapter and to continue its application in preparation for future conventions

In a letter to Phi Beta Kappa members here, the committee found a number of praiseworthy things about MSU's academ-

It praised the high proportion of Ph.D.'s on the faculty, and the good library facilities. It also commented favorably on the complete research facilities, the high salary level for staff members, and the dis-tinguished visiting lecturer program.

Why, then, is Michigan State still waiting for a Phi Beta Kappa chapter?

First, the fraternity is extremely careful about the universities where it establishes chapters. With its rigid devotion to the scholarly ideal, it cannot afford to take chances. New chapters are established only after years of investigation, during which every facet of the university's academic life is examined with the finest of finetooth combs.

Wayne University, for instance, received its chapter about 20 years after it first applied for it.

Another reason can be found in Phi Beta Kappa's traditional emphasis on the liberal arts and sciences.

MSU was founded as the world's first agricultural college. Agriculture, home economics, engineering, and other vocational subjects are still important parts of the curriculum.

In the past few years, MSU has outgrown the "vocational school" pattern. Its curriculum has been expanded to the scope of a great university. The College of Science and Arts, although fairly new in the university's history, has won its spurs academically.

Of 525 grants-in-aid made by the university last year, 450 went to researchers in the liberal arts and sciences.

In spite of the growing importance of these subjects in MSU's curriculum, however, vocational subjects will never be dropped from the curriculum. They have been the foundation of State's greatness,

and will not be relinquished for any reason. Student Congress resolutions, letters to the editor, and other efforts to get a Phi Beta Kappa chapter here will be wellmeaning but futile.

Spartans can only wait and be patient, trusting that MSU eventually will be rec-

"behind the scenes."



## TORNADO SAFETY RULES

## TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A WARNING IS RECEIVED. OR A TORNADO IS OBSERVED MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!!



If you are in open country:

- 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles
- 2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

## If in a city or town:

Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS: In homes: The southwest corner of the basement usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements should find other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar, although a depression, such as a ditch or ravine, can offer some protection. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Doors and windows on the north and east sides of the house may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection

## If in schools:

- 1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
- In rural schools that do not have atrougly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

## If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and feel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.



Keep calm! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may the up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area. ## Car Accident 'Emergency' Cited in U.S.

CHICAGO (A) - The Naional Safety Council said Sunday that a "traffic accident emergency" exists in the United States following the highest March death toll in

history.

If the present trend continues, the council figured, the all-time record of 39.969 deaths in a single year will be surpassed in 1956. The number of deaths on the nation's streets and highways in March was placed at 2.960—320 more than March 1955 and 94 above the previous record of 2,866 for the month, set in 1937. This was the 13th consecutive month of increased traffic deaths and pushed the toll for the first three months of this year to 1,590, second highest first quarter total on record.




