

Car Accident  
'Emergency'  
Cited in U.S.

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Safety Council said Sunday that a "traffic accident emergency" exists in the United States following the highest March death toll in history.

If the present trend continues, the council figured, the all-time record of 39,969 deaths in a single year will be surpassed in 1956. The number of deaths on the nation's streets and highways in March was placed at 2,860—320 more than March 1955 and 94 above the previous record of 2,866 for the month, set in 1937.

This was the 13th consecutive month of increased traffic deaths and pushed the toll for the first three months of this year to 1,590, second highest first quarter total on record.

The continued upsurge in highway slaughter prompted Ned H. Dearborn, council president, to declare and emergency and to call upon state and national authorities to make an all-out effort to reverse the trend.

Dearborn sent the tragic figures to the President's committee for traffic safety in advance of four regional conferences to be sponsored by the committee in May. The first of these meetings will open in Atlantic City Tuesday, with subsequent ones at Miami, Chicago and San Francisco.

## Good Four Years If...

High School Students  
Apply for Scholarships

Sixty-two high school students, chosen by the MSU Development Fund office, applied for the new Alumni Distinguished Scholarship Award last Friday and Saturday.

This new scholarship will provide \$1,000 annually to the ten students who win the awards. The award will continue throughout four years if the student keeps his grades at a high all-university level.

Each high school in the state and surrounding areas received announcements of the newly established scholarship in April and was asked to return a list of candidates eligible to apply for the award.

Only outstanding students in the top five per cent of the high school graduating class are qualified for the scholarship.

There were 200 applications received which were screened to total 62. Only ten scholarships will be given out each year.

The high school students arrived on campus Friday and were taken to the counseling center where each received an individual interview.

Saturday morning a three hour competitive examination was given. At noon the MSU Development Fund, sponsor of the program, treated the applicants with a get-away dinner at the Union. The new scholarship will replace the Roll Call award that provided for tuition. Winners of the new scholarship will be announced around May 15 by the scholarship office.

Reds Claim  
Any Germans  
May Go Home

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union promised Sunday it would not prevent the return home of any Germans still on Soviet territory who want to go to West Germany.

A note from the Foreign Ministry to the West German government said Soviet authorities were checking a list of 1,000 names which the German Embassy here has submitted. When the persons on it are located, they will be given every opportunity to contact the West German Embassy in Moscow and arrange repatriation, the note added.

The list of names was submitted to the Russians last month by West German Ambassador Wilhelm Haas.

The Soviet note recalled Soviet claims that a large number of Russian "displaced persons" are living in Western Germany and that the federal government had "promised to cooperate fully" in their return to Russia.

The note did not tie the two issues together in any way which would imply that the Germans would not be released unless the Russians returned home.

## Saving Daylight

50 Million  
Americans  
Change Time

Have trouble getting up Sunday morning after that late Saturday night date?

Well, don't feel too badly. Some fifty million Americans found it even tougher than you did, as Daylight Saving Time went into effect Sunday.

As a result, people in nine states and parts of 15 others lost one hour's sleep by turning their clocks ahead to gain an extra hour of daylight.

Michigan remained on Eastern Standard Time, Chicago changed to Daylight which puts it on the same time as Michigan.

New York also changed to Daylight. This has an effect on television here, as all programs originating out of New York now begin one hour earlier.

Planes, buses, and trains are not directly affected by the time change, as most all transportation services changed their schedule Sunday to meet with the change.

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


## Savoldi Wins at Drake Relays

The weather continued to plague the trackmen at the Drake Relays at Des Moines, Iowa last Friday and Saturday.

The best Spartan effort was turned in by Capt. Joe Savoldi who won the 120-yard high hurdles in the cold and rainy weather.

Savoldi's time of :14.2 was only a tenth of a second off the meet record. The all-purpose man ran :14.3 in the trials on Friday.

The four-mile relay team of Ron Wheeler, Gay Denslow, Henry Kennedy and Selwyn Jones posted a 17:51, their best of the season, but only finished third.

Kansas won the event in 17:36.8 while Illinois beat

Michigan State by only inches for second.

Ed Brabham, the Big 10 indoor dash king, was fifth in the 100-yard dash. Duke's Dave Sime set a new meet record in the event with :09.4.

Brabham ran :09.8 in both the trial and the final race.

Dave Lean could place only fourth in the 440-yard hurdles with a :54.8 while Dave Hoke was unplaced with a :55.6.

State's distance medley team was forced to drop out when Lean fell on his half-mile leg.

The two mile relay was fourth with a 7:59.9 time with Occidental College winning, in 7:47.9. The Spartan team was composed of Hoke, Wheeler, Kennedy and Jones.

The shuttle hurdles team also placed fourth with a :61.7

event in :60.3.

Michigan States team consisted of Lean, Ray Eggleston, Doug McFetters and anchored by Savoldi.

The 440-yard relay squad of Brabham, Savoldi, Eggleston and Ken Dafeo qualified for the final with a :42.7 but went unplaced.

Don Hillmer finished in a seven-way fifth-place tie in the high jump with a leap of 6'2".

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
