## **Senior Class Elections Show Need for Change**

A letter in today's "Letters to the Editor" column, signed by Jim Murray and referring to Monday's editorial entitled "Dirty Politics, Ineptness Force Senior Re-

vote" says in part:
"Wilson (Pat Wilson, senior class presi-... dential candidate) was, to say the least, quite polite, tactful and considerate in re-futing the editorial which, if it had been written in true, non-partisan style, would never have created the feeling it has."

The inference in this paragraph is that the State News favors one candidate, namely, Barry Grant, Wilson's opponent, in today's re-vote for the senior class pres-

The paper would like to make it clearcrystal clear-that it does not favor either candidate over the other.

The office of senior class president is primarily an honorary one. The person who wins the office does so on the basis of popularity. There are no political issues involved. Practically any junior with the usual requirements (i.e. all-university twopoint, a petition with the required number of signatures) can run for the office if he has the urge and ambition to place posters here and there and convince students he is the "best" man for the job.

It is for these reasons that the State News never supports any candidate for any class office. The paper strives, in fact,

If the office of senior class presidentor that of any other class office-was more than just an honorary position; if candidates for class offices had definite platforms and differing political ideals, then perhaps the State News would feel oblived to take a definite stand.

In its editorial Monday, the paper claimed that "dirty politics" was involved in last week's senior class presidential elec-

We see no reason to withdraw this claim Signed statements from people who openly admitted they voted more than once; who admitted they voted without identifying themselves; who admitted they voted out of class; who said they witnessed others violating these rules, are in our files. Some of these statements were solicited; others were given voluntarily.

One candidate's campaign manager was told that the State News had evidence that posters of his favorite were hanging in Jenison Fieldhouse, an illegal campaigning

He insisted he knew nothing of the posters and suggested they had been put up by the opposition in an effort to discredit his candidate.

Who did put the posters up is not the point here; maybe they were blown into Jenison by a strong wind. The point is that instances like this, if not precisely "dirty politics," smell strongly of same.

Probably the major blame for last Thursday's unsavory election lies with the Elections Commissioner.

She no doubt thought she was doing an adequate job. The trouble was that it was too big for her. The method of acquiring elections commissioners in the dormitories (i.e. anybody at all) was particularly faulty. There were far too many infractions of elections rules - infractions that could have been prevented had the Elections Commissioner been more alert. (Note Linda L. Unthank's letter below).



That is why he has been sus-picious and fearful of the Unit-ed States, despite the import-ant influence of this country on the final independence agree-

Soekarno and a vast propor-tion of informed Indonesians felt American economic aid to the Netherlands after the war-had prolonged the Dutch ability to hold on in the islands.

After independence, Independence was afraid of American promoters displayed a strong desire for ex-

Indonesians were not prepar-ed merely to substitute Ameri-can control of their economic interests for the British-Dutch hegemony. American economic aid was refused.

There seems to be a slightly better atmosphere now, which Secretary Dulles is anxious to nurture through the Soekarno visit. Indonesia has accepted some American aid, and as the projects work out, suspicion is somewhat allayed.

Since independence he has accepted Communist political help assumably with the same viewpoint.

The opinions he forms while in the United States will be balanced later against those he gets on a visit to Russia. The net result may have a far-reaching effect on the future of all Southeast Asia. Soekarno only 55.


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
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
