Ike Tallies 2-1 Edge In Nebraska Primary

OMAHA (AP) — If farmers in drought-disturbed Nebraska are rebelling against administration agricultural policies, they failed to give the signal in Tuesday's primary election.

A 2-1 tallying Tuesday's Wednesday established President Eisenhower's lead as a near 2-1 winner over Sen. Robert Kefauver (D-Tenn.) in presidential preference voting.

Strictly speaking, Eisenhower and Kefauver were not running against each other. Kefauver was supposed to be his own party's ballot.

The President, in outdrawing Kefauver in a style befitting this predominantly Republican state, also picked up 17 of the state's 14 full-vote GOP convention delegates.

Kefauver could claim only 3 of the 11 Democratic delegates named, with the remaining seven still undetermined.

Presidential preference results are not binding on the delegates who run unopposed. Most candidates make known their preference, however.

Write-in votes were recorded for Democrats Adlai Stevenson and Averell Harriman, Republican Vice President Nixon and several others but the totals were too small to claim significance.

Jet Crash Blamed On False Alarm

OTTAWA (AP) — The Defense Ministry Wednesday blamed a false alarm for sending up the jet plane that crashed into a naval base here and killed 15 persons.

Defense Minister Gordon Campbell said the plane was sent up on Tuesday night by mistake. A false alarm, he said, had not been immediately identified.

Before the interception was carried through, the "enemy" plane was identified as an Air Force transport returning from the Arctic.

The jet's last transmission was received at 10:30 p.m. It was a 10:30 p.m. to practice procedure for a possible nuclear attack.

The defense minister explained in answer to give pilots practice and to give up excess fuel that might endanger a safe landing.

Campbell said the plane was not given an indication of trouble.

"All evidence points to the likelihood it descended in a steep dive from a very high altitude," he said.

It flew into the west corner of the base. None of the crew survived. The crash killed 15 persons.

The pilot and the flight engineer of the plane were also killed.

Cure for Cold? Army Develops Virus Vaccine

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Wednesday announced development of a new vaccine which it said promises to reduce the number of cases of colds, influenza, pneumonia, throat and bronchitis.

An Army statement said a trial of the vaccine on more than 250 recruits at Ft. Detrick showed the number of respiratory cases of each illness was about 25 percent less.

The vaccine also shows evidence of making children resistant to colds which scientists at Walter Reed Institute of Health discovered these young men to be the cause of the respiratory disease.

The Army statement did not say how available the vaccine would be.

Egypt Recognizes Communist China

Decision Climaxes Move Toward Closer Relations

CAIRO (P) — Egypt Wednesday became the first Arab country to recognize Communist China. The decision was announced after a Cabinet meeting.

There have been several trade and cultural agreements between Cairo and Peking, but until now all the Arab states had recognized the regime of Chiang Kai-shek, with headquarters on Formosa, as the government of China.

All countries in the Soviet sphere of influence recognize Peking. Other nations doing so are Yugoslavia, India, Burma, Pakistan, Britain, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Israel, Afghanistan, Netherlands, Indonesia, Ceylon, Finland, Nepal and Switzerland.

The government of Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser has taken the so-called neutralist course in the cold war. That means recognition of both East and West and trade with both sides.

Egypt last year obtained arms from Red Czechoslovakia through Soviet Black Sea ports for its buildup against Israel. At the same time, Egypt is dickering with the West for projects such as the proposed Aswan Dam on the Nile.

The recognition decision climaxed more than a year of moves toward closer relations by the two nations. Talks at the April 1955, Asian-African conference in Bandung, Indonesia, between Egypt's Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and China's Premier Chou En-lai laid the groundwork.

An official statement Wednesday said Egypt had agreed to exchange diplomatic representatives with Red China.

There was no indication as to the future of the Nationalist Chinese Ambassador and the National Chinese Embassy in Cairo.

Cherokee Debut Put Off Until Friday

BIKINI LAGOON — Skitterish Cherokee came within one hour and thirty-six minutes of her violent debut over Namu Island this morning but vacillating winds again called her off just before the curtain went up.

She's re-scheduled for Friday under "marginal conditions" however. Although her Mid-Pacific fans are fast losing their faith in the old adage that "the show must go on."

The B-52 drop plane had been airborne with the hydrogen bomb for an hour and fifteen minutes this morning and the count-down about the 1958 A1 McKinley had already begun when the eighth cancellation of the shot in ten days was ordered from the command ship, USS Estes, at 4:15 a.m.

At 10 o'clock Tuesday night the chances looked excellent. Rear Admiral B. Hall Hanlon, joint task force commander, announced that the evacuation of Bikini Atoll had been completed and noted there had been no

contact reports from aircraft and ships sweeping the vast danger area in search of stray shipping.

The first doubts crept in at 7 a.m. with shot day one hour old, when the Admiral reported:

"Data obtained this evening indicate that our forecast is being verified at higher altitudes, those about twenty thousand feet the developing wind pattern below this level is not as favorable. We will have more wind soundings during the night and will make a final evaluation of the weather at 5 a.m."

On the chance that acceptable winds would firm up, the complex machinery of shot day was ordered in motion. The

drop plane took off from Eniwetok at 3 a.m. and other planes on various test missions roared off into the darkness one by one.

Admiral Hanlon didn't have to wait until 5 a.m. for his decision, however. At 4:15 a.m. news correspondents, already awakened by the beginning of the count down aboard the Mt. McKinley, were told grimly: "the shot's off" and handed the following explanation from the Estes:

"The forecast fallout pattern for this morning is not acceptable and the Cherokee Test is being postponed. The task force will continue on a D minus one status in hope of firing Friday morning."

"Late data obtained on winds below twenty thousand feet disclosed they were holding out of the north instead of changing to southwesterly as had been indicated by the trend through Wednesday."

"The winds at the lower levels have sufficient influence to change the fallout forecast from open ocean areas to one of fallout on the Marshalls."

"Everyone in the task force is now pointing toward dawn tomorrow, albeit with little optimism, in the knowledge that 'favorable' weather (if it can be called favorable under these circumstances) occurs here at the Pacific proving ground only once every eight to ten days."


