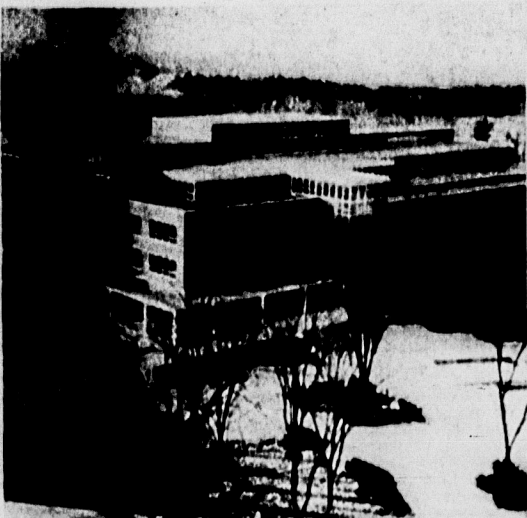

Unexpected Winds Delay Bomb Shot

Feared Fallout On Marshall Islands

BIKINI LAGOON — Chetoke, the elusive hydrogen shot, won at least a 48 hour reprieve before sunrise this morning and thereby proved again that weather forecasting is not an exact science.

Scheduled for 5 A.M. the mammoth detonation was called off 31 minutes before 11-hour because of "vague, unexpected winds."

The official report from task force headquarters on the command ship USS Estes read in part:

"Lower level winds observed during the late hours before scheduled shot time were not acceptable. As a result it was probable there would be fall out on the northern Marshall Islands of Rongelap and Rongerik."

"Safety sweeps by aircraft and surface ships had disclosed no shipping in the controlled area."

"The H-52 drop plane took off from Eniwetok at scheduled 3:45 a.m. In case of an abort while the big ship was airborne with the H-bomb, plans called for the plane to orbit until after sunrise (6:45) before landing on Eniwetok's 8,000 foot runway."

Today's postponement following that of yesterday morning, automatically put the shot off 48 hours to provide time for re-checking technical systems and rest for the H-52 crew, task force staff members and scientists who worked all night for the second consecutive night.

The task force has reverted to D minus two status, with H-hour tentatively rescheduled for dawn Sunday, Saturday, U. S. time.

The abrupt announcement in an atmosphere of rising tension and soaring hope brought only a stark moment of silence in the war room, followed by a pull of gloom and cynical remarks.
