## Executive Cabinet Passed by AUSG

### Fall, Winter Term Budget Also Receives Approval

Congress members approved the president's executive cabinet, the budget for fall and winter term, passed two resolutions, two bills and took no action on a third bill in their meeting Wednesday night.

Appointed members of the executive cabinet were: treasurer, Rex Dawson, Toledo junior; administrative assistant, Jack Schramm, Lansing sophomore; Campus Chest, Fred Raymond, Detroit sophomore; election commissioner, Pat Tavenner, Lansing junior; organization director, Carol Hodge, East Lansing junior; and personnel director, Barry Grant, Detroit junior.

More are: Spartan Spirit, Roger Forbush, Rochester sophomore; academic benefits, Kris Kaestner, Dearborn sophomore; and Bill Berman, Whitehall sophomore.

Budget for fall and winter term contingency fund will total \$2,150. Included in the fund are labor, materials and supplies, equipment, travel and business, communications and postage, hospitality, elections, public relations and the Wolverine.

The student fund budget will total \$6,000. Listed under the student fund are Spartan Spirit, traffic court, student orientation, and the all-university judiciary.

A resolution giving the president or speaker the power to call a meeting of a special committee during summer term was passed.

A resolution designating a committee to investigate administration of married housing was passed favorably and was referred to the Student Rights and Welfare committee.

A bill on organization change in Campus Chest was passed, giving the head of Spartacade a vote in place of the head of organization and planning and the slating head.

A temporary charter was given to the Finned Spartans, a skin diving organization.

No action was taken on the Association of Off-Campus Students request for a permanent charter.

Joe Khea, Lansing sophomore, was appointed to fill the Lansing seat vacancy until the fall election.

Unions, Company Agree to Contract

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Western Union Telegraph Co. and two labor unions agreed Wednesday on a new two-year contract.

R. A. Morgan, assistant company vice president, said the agreement calls for a 13 cent-an-hour across-the-board increase for all employees, plus 5 cents additional effective next Jan. 1 to correct job inequities, and improvements in pensions and messenger allowances.

The unions involved are the Commercial Telegraphers Union and the American Communications Assn. Int.

They had sought a 27-cent increase in wages and other improvements. The workers' average earnings have been \$1.65 hourly.

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP)—David Barkley said Wednesday he would be willing to run for the unexpired portion of his late father's term in the U. S. Senate.

Barkley said his decision was made at the insistence of friends who want to submit his name to the Democratic State Committee.

The committee will meet soon to select a candidate to run in November for the term expiring in 1961.

Robert Humphreys, committee chairman, called the development "news to me." Gov. A. B. Chandler had no comment.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower presented a figure of unvarnished confidence about his own political future Wednesday.

He declared in a rather breezy, lighthearted fashion that he hadn't even discussed specific details of the campaign with Republican National Chairman Leonard Hall or anybody else.

### Kefauver, Harriman Alliance Called Possible

A strong showing by Adlai Stevenson in the California primary Tuesday has opened the possibility Wednesday that Sen. Estes Kefauver might seek an alliance with New York Gov. Averell Harriman in the Democratic presidential race.

Stevenson all but blasted Kefauver out of the nomination contest with more than a quarter-million vote margin. He carried off California's 54 electoral votes to put him well in front of other aspirants for the party nomination.

Supporters of Kefauver and Harriman denied that any deal is likely between them. Stevenson leaders said they fully expect and are prepared for such a move.

Stevenson said, "As a result of the California primary, I think that the strongest other Democratic contender is Gov. Harriman of New York."

Harriman is assured of most of New York's 98 votes in Tuesday's state primary but six Stevenson supporters with one vote each won places on the delegation. Harriman has picked up 13 votes thus far in other states.

Reported Fund Pledge Denied by Davis Friend

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—The man who has been quoted as saying that Wisconsin industrial leaders are pledged to raise a \$150,000 campaign fund in behalf of Rep. Glenn Davis, a Republican-endorsed candidate for U. S. senator, denied Wednesday that he ever mentioned such a sum.

The statement, reported to be made by Robert Dalton, a friend of Davis, has become the theme of the 32-year-old senator's campaign. He charged that he was unfairly "regrouped by the kingmakers" of the state Republican organization in his bid for party support for a fourth term.

## Ike Urges Restoration Of Foreign Aid Budget

### Tito Affirms U. S. - Slav Friendship

#### Ignores McCarthy Aid Cut Resolution

MOSCOW (AP)—President Tito of Yugoslavia said Wednesday night Sen. McCarthy's resolution to stop U. S. aid to Yugoslavia is unimportant and not a threat to his friendly relations with the United States.

Tito indicated he would visit the United States—if invited. The visiting Yugoslav chief talked informally to a reporter at a grand reception in his honor at the Kremlin.

Asked about the resolution McCarthy introduced in the U. S. Senate Tuesday, Tito replied:

"It is not important. Our relations with the United States will not suffer. Our friendship with the United States will continue as before our trip here."

Informed of Tito's reaction, McCarthy said in Washington:

"My position is the same. The theory behind giving foreign aid is that it should be used to aid those opposed to Communist aggression. Tito has reaffirmed his adherence to the Kremlin. There is no reason on earth to give him American dollars."

Tito insisted his visit to Moscow "will contribute to better relations with the United States, with Russia, with all countries."

McCarthy proposed to cut off all U. S. aid to Yugoslavia because of "Tito's pro-Russian statements during the current visit to Moscow." McCarthy's move was commended by the Senate minority leader, Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.).

President Eisenhower said in Washington Wednesday he believed there should be a re-evaluation of aid to Yugoslavia. Eisenhower told a news conference the United States must continue to work for peace but must have a continuous study of the foreign aid program to keep it in the right place.

Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev also spoke of improving U. S. relations in a chat with John A. Kennedy of San Diego, Calif., who publishes the Sioux Falls, S. D., Daily Argus Leader.

Kennedy remarked that after a month's tour of Russia he believed "our countries can and must get together."

Discussing with reporters later the progress of his talks with the Soviet leaders, Tito said:

"They have so far been on a state to state level. But why should we not discuss co-operation between the Communist parties of our two countries? We have relations with other Socialist parties and all progressive movements."

### Committee Chairman Defends Cut

#### Rayburn Favors Compromise Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—House forces deployed for a major battle over foreign aid Wednesday after President Eisenhower said it would be "tragic" if Congress doesn't support his program.

House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) indicated the main drive would be toward restoration of about half the \$1,109,000,000 slashed from the administration's foreign aid budget by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Although top Democratic and Republican leaders appeared to be getting together on some sort of restoration move, there were still lots of opposition in the House to giving Eisenhower the full \$4,000,000,000 he wants to carry on the mutual security program through the 12 months beginning July 1.

Rep. Richards (D-S.C.), chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee, announced he would fight for the cut his committee approved by a 24-4 vote on May 23.

Eisenhower told his news conference earnestly Wednesday that this country "must continue to wage the peace."

"We must not be parsimonious," he said. "We must support such programs as the Mutual Security Act. I would think it would now be tragic not to support these programs cheerfully and adequately."

The president was reported to have told an extraordinary bipartisan conference of House leaders earlier that it would endanger national security to cut the foreign aid budget as deeply as the foreign affairs committee did.

He said at his news conference the nation was now spending on the order of 10 billion dollars a year "waging peace," and that about 10 per cent of it was what was called mutual security.

As long as we are not shooting, we are not spending one-tenth as much as we would if we were shooting," the president told the newsmen. "And, remember, there is no restriction that we saw in World War II that would even give a hint of what another war would bring."

While the president was making these remarks, Speaker Rayburn announced he would back a move to restore 600 million dollars to the foreign aid budget.

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# By Downgrading Stalin Nikita Shows He's Boss

At the 20th Congress of the Communist Party last February, party boss Nikita Khrushchev openly denounced former Premier Joseph Stalin.

Stalin was accused of running a one-man dictatorship; of making vital policy decisions without consulting anyone; of eliminating the high command of the Russian Army before World War II; and of refusing to believe evidence that Germany was ready to attack Russia in 1941.

Along with the downgrading of the former idol, the Soviet government instituted measures designed to "soften" Stalin's iron-fisted rule. The Cominform was dissolved and steps were taken to remove or change Stalinist labor legislation.

The switch in the party line had effects in other Communist-dominated countries. Jakub Berman, deputy premier of Poland, resigned. Changes and resignations in the party's hierarchy in Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria were announced.

Outside the Iron Curtain, Communist political leaders found themselves doing some fast talking trying to explain the sudden switch in the party's line.

Last week, another change took place: Old Bolshevik Vyacheslav Molotov resigned as foreign minister. Molotov was the last cabinet member held over from the Stalin regime.

It is interesting to observe speculation on the whys and wherefores of the Russian change. Some observers claim the Russian people, fed-up with dictatorship, were ripe for revolt and that Khrushchev, in order to remain in power, had to sway with public opinion to prevent internal disorder.

More likely is the guess that the present regime is trying to win friends outside Russia by adopting milder policies.

Yugoslavia's President Tito is a case in point. In 1948 he bolted the Soviet camp, though remaining an ardent Communist.

Currently he is being wined and dined by Russian leaders. Western observers guess that Khrushchev, with Stalin out of the way and his policies changed, thinks the time is ripe to entice Tito back into the fold.

Stalin, however, has not been totally condemned. Many of his earlier accomplishments within the party are still being praised. Thousands of Russians still make pilgrimages to his tomb outside the Kremlin walls.

Khrushchev, by downgrading Stalin, has proved himself boss. Now it appears by adopting milder internal and external policies, he is trying to become a popular boss.

## Some People Are Never Satisfied

"Never satisfied" aptly describes the reaction of some students to MSU's new four million dollar library.

No screens and poor smoking facilities seem to be the two main complaints most frequently lodged against the recently completed ultra-modern structure.

Yet a look behind the scenes readily shows the whys and wherefores of the problem.

Money is the main one. Bids ran a million dollars over the four million dollars appropriated by the state legislature. "Something had to give" said William H. Combs, dean of student services.

It was decided, and wisely so, to cut out a student lounge leaving the available space for reading areas and book storage.

This brought the smoking area problem into focus.

Small areas were allowed in the men and women's washrooms for this purpose, and then with the permission of the fire marshal the areas in the stairwells were turned into "coeducational" smoking areas.

Now if some group would buy drapes for the large glass area to keep out the overabundance of sunshine, it would be a choice spot for moments of relaxation.

Combs said window coverage would cost an estimated \$375.

The other problem, air and no screens, was also discussed by Combs.

Windows were not originally planned to be opened. Constant temperature and humidity for book protection was originally included in the planning, but this was another area that lack of funds cut out.

For this reason windows were made to be opened, but no money was available for the louvered type screens wanted. These screens would have kept the sun glare and bugs out.

Special drapes have been purchased to keep out the sun, and screens will be obtained when money is available, Combs said.

The circulatory air system, when it is properly adjusted, will relieve much of the discomfort, Combs said.

With a building the size of the library, this may take six months, however.

No one is denying that there are still problems concerning the new library. But a lot has been accomplished and credit is due.

Not once has a book been out of circulation for over 30 minutes, due to library construction.

Things like this should be remembered. Gripping over the library's few deficiencies won't get them corrected any faster.

## Vote Result— Estes—Out Adlai—??

Now that Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver have ended their primary battles, the essence of the situation between them is much as it was before—Kefauver is apparently out of the running for the Democratic presidential nomination and Stevenson isn't sure of it.

From the party standpoint, one unpleasant thing has resulted from the months-long campaign.

Starting off on a fairly high plane, the contest gradually deteriorated until in its last weeks it was bitter and personal.

Kefauver and his supporters have said a lot of things which will be hard to eat if Stevenson finally is the nominee, despite Kefauver's promises of support for the Democratic candidate in his California concession statement.

Stevenson now says that Gov. Averell Harriman of New York is the chief runner-up for the nomination, and prefers to kiss off the interest being stirred up for Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri.

Party observers claim that, while California had done much to remove the scars left on Stevenson by Minnesota, the convention would still be an open one.

This was insured by the mere presence of New York's overwhelmingly pro-Harriman delegation, and the 36½ votes Lyndon Johnson of Texas will be carrying around in his pocket. Johnson has been mentioned more and more often recently as a potential candidate himself, despite the political handicap he shares with Kefauver of being from the South, where Democrats still vote in prodigious numbers without recourse to regional pride.

Johnson's reputation in the party and with the general public has been rising rapidly in the last few years. Formerly an ardent New Dealer as a member of the House, the Texan senator now ranks as a moderate.

But he has had a heart attack and hasn't been acting like a candidate. That could mean merely that he chooses to be more "inactive" than Harriman and Symington.

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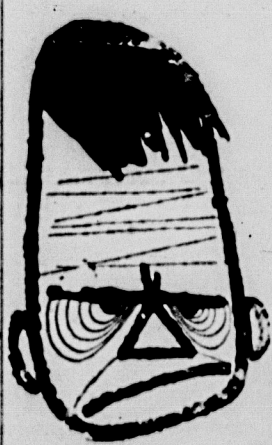

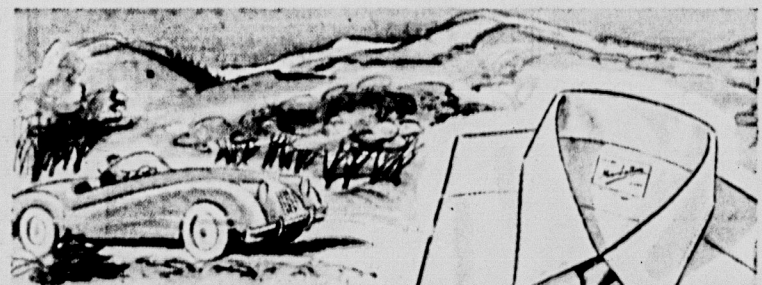

## Boudreau Shifts Right In New Mantle Defense

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Mantle said before Wednesday's game between the New York Yankees and Kansas City that he was not afraid of Lou Boudreau's latest brainchild—the rock and roll shift—declaring:

"I'll bunt it to death."

Ed Burtch, a righthander, was on the mound for Kansas City when Mantle led off the sixth, batting left-handed. Immediately, Manager Boudreau went into his right side shift, which is an exaggerated version of the famous "Ted Williams Shift," which Lou concocted against the Boston Red Sox slugger back in 1946 when he was managing Cleveland.

Here's what he did:

He moved second baseman Jim Finigan into short right field, shortstop Jim Baxes into

the second base slot and third baseman Hector Lopez into shallow center field with first baseman Vic Power playing a sort of deep first.

Left fielder Enos Slaughter moved in to play a deep third base and right fielder Harry Simpson moved to deep right center.

He packed the right side of the diamond against the switch-hitting Mantle, giving him plenty of room to bunt.

But Mickey, instead of bunting as he promised, he would do smushed a long drive to deep center, over Lopez' head.

The shift was used on Mantle again when he came to bat in the eighth with nobody on base. This time, Tom Gorman, a righthander, threw a third called strike past him.

The shift was used twice Tuesday night and both times Mantle, attempting to bunt, struck out. He homered later with a mate aboard and there was no shift on at the time.
