

The Voters Speak - As Lubell Sees It

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Samuel Lubell, whose column will appear on this page until election day, is one of America's foremost political analysts. He has an unusual understanding of economics, government, foreign policy and the nature of war. Over the years he has made an exhausive study of the voting of every county and major city in the U.S. since the Civil War. Having been trained as a popular writer and reporter he has also developed a technique for interviewing people so that their voting and our national problems come alive in terms of their own experiences.

Besides California, Lubell this week will discuss the effect of integration and economic issues which may decide the vote in the South.

In my judgement President Eisenhower will carry California

this November.

My poll-taking, man-to-man talks with Californians, and a study of the trends lead me to this conclusion. I shall endeavor to show you, in orderly fashion, what has moved me to such a conclusion.

Except for the effect of the segregation issue in the South, which will be discussed tomorow, the feelings voiced by typical voters have shown surprisingly little difference, whether the people happened to live in the Midwest or on the Atlantic or Pacific coasts.





Gridders' Surprise Air Attack Seals Fate of Visiting Hoosier

Air power struck with sudden devastation Saturday to seal the

devastation Saturday to seal the fate of the Indiana Hoosiers at Macklin Stadium.

Prior to the game, the Spar-tans had shown little in the passing department, but Sat-urday Coach Duffy Daugherty mixed a good serial attack with a bruising ground same to coma bruising ground game to com-pletely subdue the Hoosiers.

Michigan State displayed its passing attack on the first MSU-play from scrimmage when quarterback Pat Wilson completed a pass to end Jim Hinesley for 19 yards.
During the game, four MSU passers attempted 12 and completed 10 good for 204 yards. There were three touchdown passes, two by Jim Ninowski and one by Clarence Peaks.
The Hoosiers gained 123 yards in the air with Gene Cichowski gaining 55 yards with four completions on six attempts for the honors as the top IU passer.

Saturday's game was the worst defeat suffered by Coach Bernie Crimmins while he has been coaching at Indiana. Crimmins worst defeat before Saturday also came at the hands of Michigan State. In 1953 the Spartans smothered Indiana 47-18, at Macklin, also before a Homecoming crowd.






The trophies were presented during intermission at Saturday night's Homecoming dance in the aud.
