

Columbia Bird Study Completed By Zoology Prof

Dr. George Wallace, professor of Zoology, has returned to MSU from a sabbatical leave in Columbia, the land of 3,000 varieties of birds.

While studying 10 months in Popayan, Columbia with his wife and family, Dr. Wallace made a collection of 127 different species.

Indians volunteered their help as guides and hunters over the rough tropical terrain. "Columbia was difficult for travel," began Dr. Wallace, who used a jeep through most of the country. He stated, however, that North Americans can take lessons in courtesy from the South Americans. "When local natives knew I was interested in birds they would bring them to me, and they were always asking me whether I liked their country or not."

because if it deploys the bulk of its 20,000 man army along the big frontier of the west bank of the Jordan, the east bank would be left virtually unguarded. Advance posts are now held by Arab national guardmen. Israel troops posted on the east bank would give Jordan a defense in depth it now lacks.

Jordan's leaders are said to believe Israel will not launch an all-out war over the Iraqi move for three reasons:

1. The British - Jordanian treaty of 1948, under which Britain is obligated to help Jordan if it is attacked.

2. The British - French - American tripartite declaration of 1949 guaranteeing Middle East frontiers.

3. The growing strength of the Arab armies themselves.

Gridders' Surprise Air Attack Seals Fate of Visiting Hoosiers

Air power struck with sudden devastation Saturday to seal the fate of the Indiana Hoosiers at Macklin Stadium.

Prior to the game, the Spartans had shown little in the passing department, but Saturday Coach Duffy Daugherty mixed a good aerial attack with a bruising ground game to completely subdue the Hoosiers.

Michigan State displayed its passing attack on the first MSU play from scrimmage when quarterback Pat Wilson completed a pass to end Jim Hinesley for 19 yards.

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The Spartans broke the mod-

ern day team record for most yards penalized in a game with 137 yards on 12 penalties. The old record of 130 yards on 10 penalties was set against Wayne in 1945.

The passing percentage of 846 on 11 completions in 13 attempts is one of the best marks posted in a Big 10 game. The record of 889 was made by Michigan against Minnesota in 1951. The Wolverines completed eight passes in nine attempts.

As was expected, a new attendance was set at the game. Although not a capacity crowd, 58,858 crowded into the stadium.

Saturday's record breaks the old record of 52,619 set at the Purdue game in 1954. Like Saturday, that was also a Homecoming game.

The new record is within 1,200

of a sellout. The total in Macklin is listed at 60,000. Greatly helping to boost the crowd was the "The Summer" weather that prevailed during the day. At the high thermometer read a merish 84 degrees.



Eight Spartans Score Hoosiers Crumble

Mendyk, a second string left halfback who pre-
pared to play in the shadow of All-American prospect
Peaks proved once again Saturday that all the gold
was in the starting lineup.

Peaks, who tied with fullback
Don Arend for runner-up in
rushing against the Hoosiers
with 32 yards, almost stole the
show from the Spartan quar-
terback with his passing.

He completed all three of
the passes he threw for a total
of 60 yards and a touchdown.
Wilson and Ninowski each con-
nected on three of four tosses,
good for 57 and 73 yards, re-
spectively, with Ninowski boot-
ing three conversions in the
bargain, one from 17 yards out
after a holding penalty.

Mike Panich completed one
for one, gaining 14 yards in the
air.

Art Johnson, Blanche Martin,
Gilbert and Wilson all scored on
running plays, while Walt Ko-
walskyk was on the receiving end
of Peak's scoring pass.

Peaks accounted for the long-
est touchdown of the afternoon
on a 63-yard punt return. Capt.
John Matsko added two extra
points in addition to Ninowski's
three.

Indiana's lone score came
when fullback Bob Fee bulled
over from a foot out late in the
opening period. Fee led the
Hoosiers' ground attack with 34
yards, with halfback Dave Whit-
sell adding 28.

In all, Indiana ran for 96
yards, passed for 123 and picked
up 15 first downs. State had 264
on the ground, 204 via the air-
ways and 21 first downs.

Indiana Coach Bernie Crim-
mins confessed that he had an-
ticipated a strong MSU passing
attack despite the fact that the
Spartans had concentrated on
ground plays in their first two
games.

"We were prepared for it,"
he said, "but we didn't cover
them well enough."

The only serious Michigan
State injury of the game was
suffered by tackle Palmer Pyle,
who hurt his left knee.

Kennedy Finishes 1st

Harriers Sweep Buckeyes in Meet

Finishing 11 men in the first 12, Michigan State's cross
country team romped to an easy 16-47 win over Ohio State
on Old College Field Saturday morning.

Junior Henry Kennedy won his second straight race of
the season, running the four-mile course in a fast 20:04.8.

The Spartan harriers copped
all of the places in the first
twelve, except for fifth, which
was taken by the Buckeyes' Jack Blackburn.

Capt. Gay Denslow was the
runner-up for the second
straight week while Selwyn
Jones, last year's number two
man, was third. Sophomore Ron
Wheeler finished fourth, well
ahead of Blackburn. Terry
Block in sixth place completed
State's scoring.

Kennedy took the lead at the
start, passing the half mile in
10:09.

He was in the lead at the
three mile point in 14:56.2, Den-
slow and Jones still continued
to share the runner-up position
while Block dropped further be-
hind with 15:47.

Trying in the last half mile,
Kennedy had nearly a 300-yard
lead at the finish. Denslow and
Jones were together at the 35
mile point but the harrier cap-
tain's closing burst of speed
gave him the runner-up slot.

Denslow was timed in 20:09
with Jones five seconds behind
in third. Wheeler was fifth at

to practice at the same time.

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





The trophies were presented during intermission at Saturday night's Homecoming dance in the auditor.


