Tells Reds To Leave Hungary

Will Not Support UN Investigation

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Yugoslavia, the first Communist bloc member to defy Moscow, Thursday teamed with non-Communist nations in a strong demand for the Soviet Union to pull its troops out of Hungary.

But Yugoslavia failed to support the non-Communist demands for a UN investigation of the Hungarian situation.

Instead, Joza Brilley of Yugoslavia told the 76-nation General Assembly in emergency session that all outsiders should keep out of Hungarian affairs.

He spoke as a member of delegates assailed the Soviet Union for its role in putting down the Hungarian rebellion and installing the puppet regime of Premier Janos Kadar.

"We have always opposed the mining of foreign armed forces into a country," Brilley said. "It is hoped that in view of the Oct. 20 declaration of the Soviet government promising to withdraw that Soviet troops will be withdrawn."

"All we wish," Brilley added, is that the people of Hungary should enjoy freedom and independence to which they are entitled. We hope conditions will soon be established for this. The less interference from whatever source the better it is for the Hungarian people and the world. The Hungarian people are capable of solving their own problems."

The Assembly convened to clean up a list of speakers left after it approved a U.S. resolution late Sunday night, 50-8. The resolution called on the Soviet Union to withdraw and for UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to check into the situation.

Hungary, the ninth member of the bloc, was not participating at that time. Fifteen countries, including all of the Arab states and several of the Asian African Group obtained on that vote.

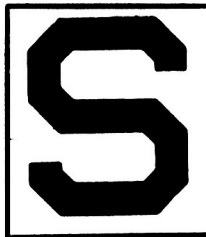

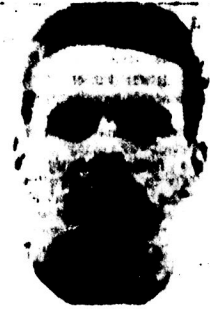
