Band, Block 'S' Combine
To Honor Sports Greats

The MSU marching band and Block S will combine today during the half-time ceremony at Mackin Stadium to honor the recently initiated into the newly named Michigan Sports Hall of Fame.

Three of the men will accept their awards in person and will appear on the field as the band plays the "Hail to the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame."

The three are Walter Hagen, former golf champion; Charles "Doc" Adams, former baseball champion and general manager of the Detroit Tigers; and the late Harry Holman, former speed boat racing champion.

The six sports personalities who will be honored through their representatives include: Jack Adams, general manager of the Detroit Red Wings hockey team; Ty Cobb, all time baseball star; Willie Houston, former Michigan All American football player; and Joe Louis, former world heavyweight boxing champion.

The late Harry Holman, former baseball great and sports writer, and the late Fielding H. Yost, former Michigan football coach, will be represented by their wives.

The nine men, the first to be inducted into the Michigan Hall of Fame, were chosen by a vote of radio and press officials throughout Michigan. All are natives of Michigan or have become nationally prominent while active in Michigan sports.

"During the Hall of Fame ceremonies Block S will contribute its share by flashing the first or last name of each celebrity as he is named."

The band will also salute the nine sports figures during half-time with the playing of "The Sports Stars in Michigan." A series of formations, demonstrating the major sports, will be presented.

The first phase of the sports salute will be a tribute to golf. The "Duffer's Delight" will be portrayed by a golf club, golf ball, and a ninth hole with a flag. The musical background will feature "Blue Skies."

Following golf, the band will salute baseball by featuring a baseball bat and baseball mitt. The musical selection will be the spirited "Take Me Out To The Ball Game."

As a humorous touch, the band will assume a pugilistic formation, forming two mobile-stick men prize fighters who spar to the tune of "Shall We Dance?"

Representing the winter sport of hockey, the band will form an ice skate and then will swing into a waltz beat for their selection of Paul Whitehead's "Skate or Skeeze."

Returning to the present scene, the band will play "Marching On the Parade," which will be the background for the following "Hall of Fame" ceremonies.

In a reversal of procedure, the traditional salute to MSU and the visiting Purdue team will precede the regular half-time theme. The band will form the name "Purdue" while playing the Boilermakers fight song, "Hail Purdue." The band will then spell the letters "MSU" in the music of the "Fight Song" and "MSU Shadows."

For the pre-game shock the band will enter the stadium with the characteristic "kick step" and will form into four company fronts. After the facing and a feature, they will step off with the "Fight Song" and proceed to the end of the field.

Following this, the band will present the position for the playing of the National Anthem and the ceremonies which are to follow.

Purdue University fans and players will have musical encouragement at Saturday's game even though the Purdue band is not coming to East Lansing.

The 26 piece activity band will perform at the Purdue band by playing the school's traditional music and being ready to march off with "Hail Purdue" should the Lafayette gridblers score.

The activity band, which plays at MSU basketball games, pep rallies and other events, is directed by C. Oscar Stover, who assists Prof. Leonard V. Falcone with the 125 piece marching band.

Grid Squad
Remembers
Thermopylae

"Remember Thermopylae!" The Spartan gridblers, remembering the day in 1953 that Purdue's student newspaper intimated "Thermopylae 1953" have made this their battle cry for this afternoon's contest with the Boilermakers.

It was in 1953 that a determined Purdue squad met the highly favored Spartans, who had run up a streak of 28 consecutive wins over a period of three seasons, and surprised the sports world by coming away with an upset, 6-0, decision.

That was Thermopylae. In 1950, the Spartans sunk to a 3-6 record after having finished the preceding year with only the Purdue loss (marking a perfect record). This time the Boilermakers dealt State a 27-13 defeat, in mark one of the rare times in recent years that a school has won two straight from the Spartans.

1955 was Michigan State's year for revenge, and Coach Duffy Daugherty's squad was merciless, blanketing Purdue, 27-0.

Going into today's game, the record for the Purdue-MSU series stands at 4-3-1, with the Boilermakers hold the slight advantage in the series, which began in 1918.

State has the added incentive today of being able to even the record with a win. And they haven't forgotten Thermopylae, either.

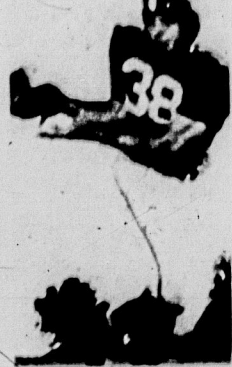

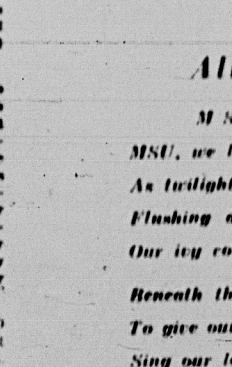

'The Arm's' Arm
Is Key TodayInjured Throwing Shoulder
May Halt Dawson's Tossing

Michigan State's gridblers, plagued by costly injuries throughout the season, may have a chance to see what effect the loss of an important player can have on their opponents for a change when they clash with Purdue's Boilermakers at 1:30 this afternoon at Mackin Stadium.

After building up a 14-0 lead, with only an upset at the hands of Illinois spoiling a perfect season, the Spartans can point with pride to their famous depth which sustained them despite heavy injury losses in the first two games.

Today they will square off against a Purdue squad which will be operating with what amounts to a broken arm, if reports that the Boilermakers' star quarterback Lennie Dawson might not see action, hold true.

Dawson, who leads the Big 10 in passing and total offense and has completed more passes this year than State has attempted as a team, has been the big question mark in the Purdue training camp during the past week.

Latest reports from the Boilermakers coaching staff list Dawson, still recovering from a shoulder injury, as a questionable starter today. He missed practice earlier in the week, and was held to limited workouts after that.

In addition to losing for five of Purdue's 11 touchdowns, Dawson has booted 11 extra points and has handled the kickoff and punting duties as well.

Lamar Lundy, a towering 6'6" end, has been Dawson's favorite target, the two having connected 11 times for 177 yards gained and two TDs. Halfback Erby Barnes has also scored 11 aeries, and has gained 132 yards and a pair of six pointers.

The workhorse of the Boilermaker backfield has been fullback Melvin Dillard, who has lugged the ball 131 times for 606 yards and a 4.6 yard average gain per carry.

Purdue, chosen by many as a good bet for the Big 10 Rose Bowl bid before the season because of their "easy" schedule, has fared badly in conference play to date. So far, they have tied Wisconsin and Illinois, while losing to Iowa by one point and Minnesota by seven. In non-conference action they have defeated Missouri and Notre Dame.

The Boilermakers are now in eighth place in the Big 10, ahead of Wisconsin and Northwestern.

Michigan State, after winning its first four games of the season and gaining a No. 1 national rating, dropped to fourth place in the nation after being dumped by the Illini, 20-13, but came back to whitewash Wisconsin, 24-0, on the following Saturday to begin a "comeback" campaign.

The Spartans are in comparatively good physical shape this weekend, despite the fact that six members of the team, including two starters, have been sidelined for the year due to injuries.

Walt Kowalczyk, who missed several starting assignments early in the year while he was still bothered by his bad ankle, will probably open the game at his right half-back position.

Kowalczyk played his best game of the season against Wisconsin last week, picking up 44 yards and scoring a touchdown.

At left half will be Denny Mendyk, the team's leading groundgainer with 315 yards and a 7.6 average. Mendyk, moved up from the second string after Clarence Peaks was put out of action with a knee injury at Illinois, is expected to handle the punting department, too, if he is needed.

Pat Wilson, who hit on three of four passes last week for 124 yards and a touchdown, will be in at the quarterback spot, with Don Gilbert, possessor of a steady 5.8 yard rushing average, at full.

On the line, State will have several of the top linemen in the conference to bolster the defense that has allowed only 44 enemy points in six games.

Joel Jones, a converted end who has gained wide acclaim at his left tackle position since he was switched in spring practice, will lead the forward wall, with center Capt. John Matsko, guards Cliff LaRose and Dan Currie and tackle Joe Carruthers rounding out the first string unit.

At the end positions will be Jim Hinesly and Tony Kolodziej. Kolodziej, after enjoying only a mediocre early season, grabbed three passes against the Badgers last Saturday, netting 123 yards and a touchdown and also playing a standout defensive game.

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Mollenkopf in 1st Year As Boilermaker Head

Ken (Jack) Mollenkopf of Purdue has waited 25 years to become a head football coach in college.

He'll be 51 on Nov. 25 and if the Boilermakers don't have a winning season they'll be the first Mollenkopf-coached team to finish in the red.

Jack didn't have a losing season in 15 years of high school coaching in Ohio before Stu Holcomb brought him to Purdue in 1940 as first coach. He got his chance to boss a Big 10 team last winter when Stu was named athletic director at Northwestern.

Purdue's new coach was a football end and baseball catcher at Bowling Green, (Ohio) University before attracting attention with a half dozen undefeated high school teams at Rossford and Walke of Toledo.

Purdue officials noted that Mollenkopf's lines played a major part in Boilermaker victories that ended long winning streaks for Notre Dame and Michigan State in the post-war period. It also noted that he is an organizer. He had been one of the leaders in reorganizing the Ohio High School Football Coaches' Association and was president twice. He organized the first Ohio high school coaching school and presented the first Ohio All-Star prep game.

Purdue had a theory that a winner in high school should be a winner at the university level.

It took only one game, Purdue's opening 14-7 victory over Missouri, to prove that the Boilermakers were going to be a colorful team with a varied attack. They have one of the nation's top passers in quarterback Lennie Dawson and a couple of outstanding pass catchers in Hank Landry and Bob Knevel, but they did their scoring against the Tigers on the ground. They won their first game, Notre Dame, 28-14.

Mollenkopf sticks to the conventional T formation but he has widened out from formation.

Purdue is going to pass, never fear, but opponents can't prove their entire effort to stopping Dawson.

Mollenkopf has a tremendous job in trying to improve on Holcomb's 3-2-1 record of last year.

"Nevertheless," Mollenkopf says, "I prefer being head coach. When I make the decision, I don't have to wonder if I had a better idea than the one we used."

In the game that will probably determine the representative, Iowa journeys to Minnesota hoping to repeat the 26-6 white wash it shipped over the Gophers last year.

Soccer Team Faces Two Big Opponents

In what will be the biggest roadblock to an undefeated season, Michigan State's soccer team takes on Wheaton (Ill.) today and unbeaten Navy Pier Sunday.

Navy Pier (University of Illinois at Chicago) is currently leading the Midwestern Soccer Conference with an 8-0 record and Wheaton's leaders have a 7-2 won-lost record.

The Spartans have a six game win streak on the line, extending back from last spring, including three victories this fall.

Three of Coach Kenney's crew, however, are on the injury list and may see limited action this weekend.

At Sarria is still bothered by an injury to the instep of his right foot and has been switched from inside right to inside left to keep the pressure off the right foot. But this was also the case last Saturday and Sarria played the entire game against Kenyon (Ohio) and scored five of the six Michigan State goals.

Co-captain Ray Burdett has two bad ankles, injuring one last week and the other before the season opened. Burdett will probably start though, according to Kenney.

Santiago Cabal, who didn't make the trip to Kenyon last week, should see limited action Saturday and Sunday. If he is unable to play, Wally Burger will take over the right wing slot again.

The present leader of the Big 10, Ohio State, puts its undefeated conference record on the line against Indiana at Columbus.

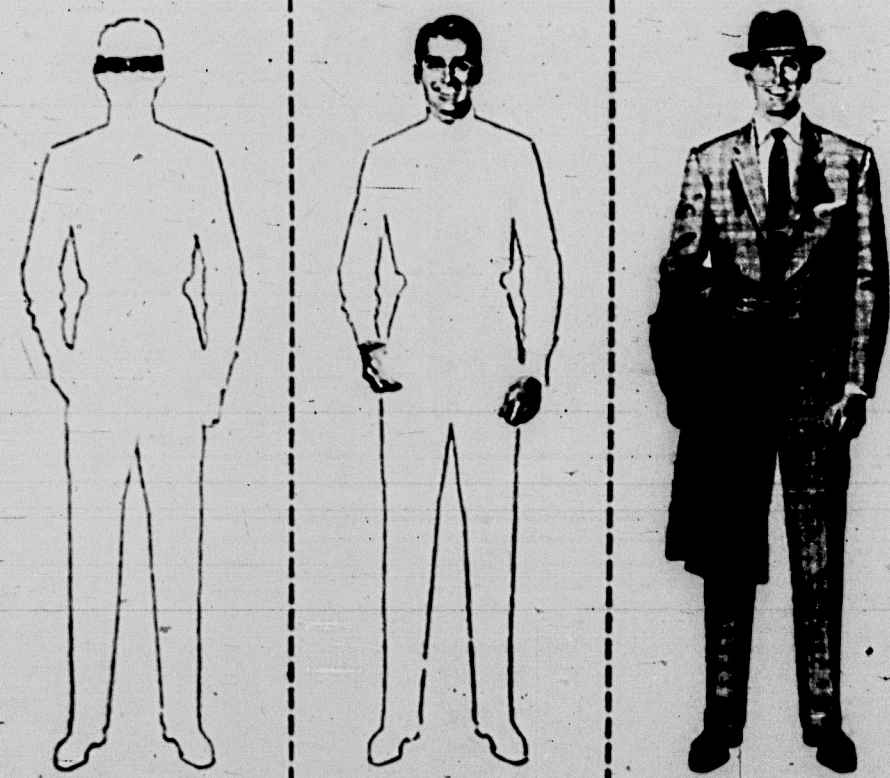

In their drive for an unprecedented third straight Big 10 title, Ohio State must, after today, still face the challenges of Michigan and Iowa.

Co-cellar dwellers of the league, Wisconsin and Northwestern, will duel at Madison for the Badgers' homecoming.

Neither team has entered the conference win column as yet, the Badgers losing to Iowa, Ohio State and Michigan State and Northwestern yielding to Michigan, Indiana and the Buckeyes.

Each, however, can claim one tie. Wisconsin drew with Purdue, 6-6, and the Wildcats worked a double shutout with Minnesota.

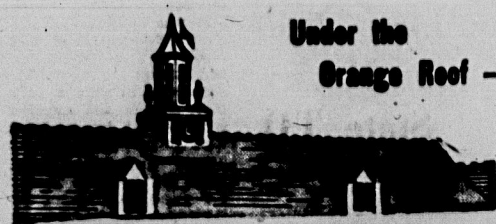

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Spartan Offense and Defense Ranked First in Conference

Chalk Up 108 Tallies In 4 Games

Wilson, Mendyk Among Leaders

Michigan State's offensive and defensive rating vaulted to first place in the Big 10 after the Spartans' 33-0 win over Wisconsin last Saturday.

In four conference games the Spartans have rolled up 108 points while holding their opponents to a mere 26.

Ohio State, last week's top offensive squad, slipped to the fifth position with its not too impressive 6-2 squeaker over Northwestern.

Although the Buckeyes have held their opponents to only eight points in three league games, the Spartans still are ranked first defensively as the figures are based on a comparative grading which includes number of points scored, yards gained and first downs both for and against.

In total points the Spartans are all alone in a field by themselves. Iowa is their closest contender with 58 and ranked second in the offensive department.

Purdue moved into third spot both offensively and defensively. The Boilermakers' still looking for their first conference win against two setbacks and two ties, have scored 47 points while their opponents have rolled up 33 tallies.

The Badgers are hugging the cellar in both categories. The Wisconsin 11 has pushed across 13 points while its opponents have turned the trick 73 times.

In first downs the Spartans have chalked up an average of 15.2 per game while the foes have been held to 13.2.

Michigan State's ground attack has averaged an amazing 358 yard per game, 41 yards more than Illinois its nearest contender.

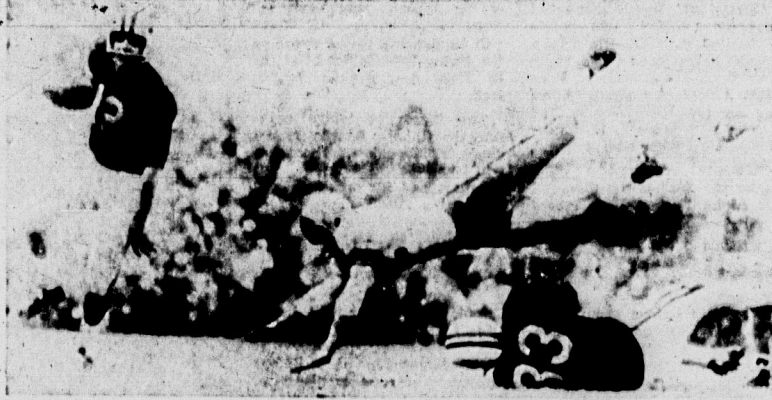
Another big first for the Michigan State team is its 93-yard average per game in the penalty department. The Badgers have lost only 17.7 yards each game to be the least penalized team in the conference.

Pat Wilson is currently rated second only to Purdue's Lennie Dawson in passing. Wilson has hit on seven out of 12 attempts for a .583 percent and 212 yards. One of his tosses was good for a TD.

Dawson has connected on 47 out of 79 aerials for 876 yards and a .595 percent. Five of his tosses have been good for scores and eight have been intercepted.

Dennis Mendyk's three conference touchdowns moved him in to a three-way tie for fifth place in Big 10 scoring. Mendyk's 67-yard punt return against Wisconsin established a new season's mark in that department.

Clarence Peaks, sidelined for the season due to injuries, is still ranked first in punting and punt returns. The speedy Spartan back got off 13 boots good for a 40.9 yards average. In three punt returns he averaged 23.7 yards a try. Mendyk is second with an average of 23.2 yards in 5 returns.

"The Greatest"

The greatest in collegiate history. That's what the coaches and observers around the nation are starting to call the 1956 Michigan State cross country team.

After MSU's 15-10 trouncing of Penn State two weeks ago, Nittany Lion Coach Chick Werner, one of the top cross country coaches in the nation, had nothing but praise for the undefeated Spartans.

"It was a terrific performance," Werner said. "I think it might be the greatest in American history. Somehow you don't mind losing like that if the other team is superb."

What have the harriers done to deserve this praise? Besides thoroughly crushing one of the top cross country powers in the East, the harriers have trounced Ohio State, Wisconsin and Notre Dame in dual meets besides winning the Michigan AAU championship.

Henry Kennedy, one of the greatest cross country runners in collegiate history, Selwyn Jones and Capt. Gay Denslow are the three big reasons for the harriers' success.

In the Penn State meet Kennedy was timed in 25:20.3, with Jones and Denslow also breaking the old course record set by Pitt's fabulous Arnie Sowell last year.

Werner estimated that the Penn State course is a minute and a half slower than the Van Cortlandt Park course in New York City, site of the IC4A championships in 10 days. If that's the case Kennedy's time on Van Cortlandt should be 23:50. The course and meet record is 24:30.1 while Kennedy won the title there last year in 24:30.3.

Being overshadowed, but not forgotten, are Jones and Denslow, two runners who would be the top men on any other team in the nation. Their Penn State times should place them well under 25 minutes at the New York course.

Most schools are content if they can get three men under 26 minutes.

In addition to having three outstanding runners, the team also has depth with Ron Wheeler and Terry Block. Both are outstanding runners and have the ability to upset their highly touted teammates.

To be the greatest of all time also means that State's aggregation is better than the Indiana squad of 1936 and 1937. Until now, no team could compare with the Hoosier team of Don Lash, Deckard, Jim Smith and Mel Trutt.

The Hoosiers swept everything in their path but failed to win a NCAA cross country title, solely because the title run was not started until 1938.

But as Lauren Brown, former Michigan State cross country coach who won five straight IC4A titles in the early 1930's, said, it is difficult to compare teams, especially when there is a 20-year difference.

Since 1930, Michigan State's harriers have won four Big 10 titles, nine IC4A championships and five NCAA crowns, the most consistent cross country power in the nation.
