WASHINGTON (4). The Immigration Service said Tuesday time Hungarian refugees had been returned to Austria, including one family of five for "false and fraudulent statements" relating to their background. One of the nine, the service said, asked to be returned. Three others, the service said, had their "parole" admissions revoked for misrepresentations" made to federal officials in their applications for admission. "Parolees" are admitted to this country on an emergency basis, and have no status as permanent residents.

Negroes Hit Bus Scat Plan

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (A)—Negro leaders today denounced the new bus seat assignment plan ordered by the city commission as an "unquitous scheme" to delay integration and declared they would not subscribe to it. The plan allows drivers to assign tides to specific seats for which they are handed tickets. Passengers are required to occupy these seats under penalty of a possible \$500 fine or 60 days jail sentence unless they elect to have their fares refunded

Britain Protests Desert Raids

LONDON (P)-Britain Tuesday charged desert warriors from Ye sula and burning down houses and damaging government buildings. A note of protest handed the Yemen charge d'affaires here said tribesmen from Yemen on Dec. 31 occupied the site of a ruins at Al Hajār, inside the Aden protectorate, and were attacked by Brit-

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (A) — The UN Political Committee backed a U.S. proposal Tuesday to try again to unite Korea through UN-supervised elections. The 80-nation committee approved a U.S. resolution by a vote of 57-8 with 13 abstentions. Delegates acknowledged the resolution contained no new approach to a settlement of the 10-year-old korean problem. And there was no sign Communist North Korea would allow the UN to supervise elections.

Rule Changes NCAA Will Consider Group's Proposals

AFCA Plans

ST. LOUIS (49 The rules committee of the American Football Coaches Assn. Tuesday recommended a liberaliza-tion of the substitution rule and an official check on the legality of substitutions and expressed a general satisfaction

with the way the game has been conducted for the past

few seasons.

The AFCA Rules Committee, headed by Leu Little, recently-retired Columbia coach, proposed allowing any player to return to a game once during a quarter after being taken out. It also suggested an official or officials be designated to check on incoming substitutes, pointing to a simple plan employed in the Southeastern Conference during the past season.

Two subjects that produced some red hot debates about changing the rules a couple of years ago—false starts and faked injuries—were rejected as being no longer important.
