Eden, a hero of World War I, combines determination—some call it stubbornness—with cour-age. During his long tenure as Foreign Secretary he made the black homburg hat his personal black homburg hat his personal

black homburg hat his personal symbol "because I look such a fool in a bowler (derby)."

Educated at Eton and Oxford, Eden typified the upper class Englishman who regards public service as the highest duty. He first entered Parliament in 1923. Regarded from the first as a man with a future he became Foreign Secretary in 1935. He was 38 at the time, the youngest man to hold that post in nearly a century.

Eden struggled tirelessly to hind his back to appease dieta-tors Hitler and Mussolini.

His break with Chamberlain actually helped his career. Churchill stood at his side and once described Eden as "the only fresh figure of first magnitude arisine out of the generation rayaged by the (first) great

During World War II Eden served as Dominions Secretary, under Chamberlain, and War Secretary and Foreign Secretary

under Churchill.

The Labor Party came to power in 1945 putting both Churchill and Eden in the opposition. When Churchill came back as Prime Minister following the Conservative victors victors. ing the Conservative victory of October, 1951, Eden again be-

October, 1951. Eden again be-came Foreign Secretary, and stayed until he rose to Prime Minister.

Eden was made a Knight of the Garter, one of the world's oldest knightly orders, in 1954. Two other former Prime Minis-ters, Churchill and Earl Attlee, also are members of that order.
