German Unity Talk Here Again

Every now and then son cornes up with the idea that, since Russia and the United States will have to withdraw their troops from Germany someday, they should do it now

This is frequently accompan-ied by the suggestion that East and West Germany will event-ually defy the occupying na-tions and negotiate their own unification anyway.

Proponents hold that it would be better for the United States and Russia to negotiate with-drawal now than for the United States, when Chancellor Aden-ance is gone and a new govern-ment takes over West Germany, to Jace a format demand for withdrawal.

That is the point being made now by Sen Humphrey (D-Minn) who is also a member of the US delegation to the United Nations He suggests withdrawal negotiations should have been included in the new American disamament pro-

posals
It sounds logical. A time-hon-ored method of approaching peace, through countless arms, the negotiations, has been to end contact between opposing

In addition, the presence of United States and allied troops in West Germany, is the only bulwark behind which that country can live white building of its military strength to the point where it would have equal power in negotiating with the East German Reds.

Russia long ago built up a

Russia long ago built up a police force in East Germany, which is really an army at the command of the Communist puppet regime.

Right now, the allied armies
in West Germany represent her
and Western Europe's only insurrance against Communist attack. These forces are small, and
even with atomic weapons could
hardly hope to long withstand
an all-out attack. But that is not their fundamental purpose

The presence of American troops along the Elbe means that Russia will not attack West Germany and Western Europe until she is ready to attack the United States directly, for that is what it would mean.

Travels 55,000 Miles in 2 Years

WASHINGTON (4) -The Navy announced Wednesday that the atomic submarine Nautilus will be refueled 'for the first time" this spring - after more than 55,000 miles of travel.

The Nautilus started, her crusing Jan 17, 1955. In the two years since, she has piled up the 55,000 miles, most of that widle submerged. She was the world's first submarine to be

world's first softmarine to be proceed by nuclear energy.

The Navy announcement said that "special equipment and techniques will be used to perform bistory's first atomic ship refueling operation." The Naulius is designed "to permit refueling during normal overhauliperied," the Navy said.

The results is to be done of the process of the navy said.

The refueling is to be done at the Electric Boat division of the General Dynamics Corp., pre-sumably at Groton, Conn.

The uranium core of the Nau-tilus' reactor, or source of power, will be pulled out and shap-ped to Arco, Idaho, the Atomic Energy Commission's hig test laboratory for examination. The unused portion of the uran-

ium will be reclaimed at Aco for future use. The heat generated by con-trolled nuclear fission in the atomic core is transferred through a pressurized water line (which passes on the heat energy but not the radioactivity) to a conventional steam turbine. The turbine drives the propel-

The submarine Seawolf has had her nuclear fuel aboard for months, standing by to start sea trials. However, a leak in the heat exchange system caused postponement of plans for the trials and may compel redesign of that portion of the nuclear power plant. Cracks in piping developed from chemical reaction of the liquid metal, sodium, used as a heat exchanged in the power plant for the Seawolf.





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
