

WASHINGTON (A) Sec. retary of State Dulles sought King Saud's support Thursday for President Eisenhower's program to insulate the Middle East against communism so that-troubled area can settle its problems in peace.

Dulles conferred with the Saudi Arabian king for about two hours at Blan House, official guest house where Saud is staying a cross Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House.

Dulles arranged a dinner night in Saud's honor. President Nixon entertained the 55-year-old monarch at lunch

Eisenhower gave Saud an un-precedented personal welcome yesterday and arranged a final round of conferences for tomor-row. The final day of the King's state visit. Saud vetoed plans for a nationwide tour thereafter, electing to stay for nine or 16 days at a resort near Washing-tom—tentatively the Greenbrier Hotel at While Sulphur Springs, W. Va.

Eisenhower and Dulles are trying to win Saud's support of the President's Mid-East proposal. As approved by the House vesterday, if would empower the President to use military force to counter any overt Communist attack. It also provides for stepped-up military and economic aid.
