Flight Program Is Initiated

The Army ROTC flight program began officially Tuesday when Cadet Captain Wendell Vincent, Centerville senior, and Cadet Lieutenant James S. Ware, Kalamazoo senior, flew with instructors at Capital City Airport, according to Colonel Harry W. Gorman, professor

of Military Science.

Congress authorized a four year appropriation of tunds for the program, the first in the state of Michigan and one of the few in the United States.

Under this program Army ROTC senior cadets will receive thirty-five hours of ground school training by approved CAA instructors at Hebert Aviation and thirty-five hours of flight training in Piper Tri-Pacers, the same plane which the AFROTC is using for cadet training.

On completion of the training program cadets will receive a private pilot's license.

They will go to Gary Army Air Base, San Marcus, Texas, for the first part of their assign-ed training. Following that, they will complete the final stage of their training at the Army Avia-

tion Center, Ft. Rucker, Ala.

During this year nineteen cadets are scheduled for flight training, and an estimated twenty will be eligible for next year's
