Vote Reverses In Secret Ballot

A bill to provide students with the opportunity to vote for Student Government president by popular ballot was defeated, 29-18, in Student Congress Wednesday night. A secret third ballot completely reversed an earlier 24-18 vote in favor of the bill on a roll call ballot the committee of the

The controversial proposed dislation was reported favorably out of the elections committee, with five clarification recomendations which Congress

Heated debate over wording of arrious passages in the document resulted in a rash of minor images before the roll call vote inally passed it, allowing it to before the entire Congress for immoval.

After a spirited discussion of the bill on the floor, Congress yoled by show of hands to use the secret ballot in making its third and final decision.

AUSG President Bob Becker spoke in behalf of the bill, crafted by Roger Augustine, chief truffic court justice, before the last vote was taken.

JERUSALEM (P)-Israeli roops and administrators neaded home from the Gaza Strip Wednesday night in a withdrawal operation due to be completed by 7 p.m. to-

Others based on the Agaba Gulf coast loaded their equip-ment aboardship at Sharm El Sheikh for a similar pullout.

The exodus came as Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion re-

Israel's parliament — torn by dissension for days over the withdrawal order — largely closed ranks behind Ben-Gurion

UN emergency force troops moved into the Gaza Strip, home to about 230,000 Aram refugees of the Palestine War of 1948, largely supported by the UN works and relief agencies.

If all goes according to plan,

the 26 by 8-mile Mediterranean coastal strip will be occupied by Danish, Norwegian, Swedish and Indian troops by daybreak today Israelis will remain in only one small camp near Rafa at the Strip's southern end.

The UN forces in Gaza are under command of Col. Walter Lindquist of Sweden. A UN spokesman said the emergency forces had encountered no incidents or difficulties in Gaza.

There are approximately 12,800 legal parking spaces on campus at present which include 7,500 on surfaced parking lots and street spaces; and 5,300 spaces on unpaved

Added parking will soon be available in the area of Olin Memorial Hospital where construction shacks are standing.

But the only way the overall picture can be cleared up is with money. According to Harold W. Lautner, department head of Landscape Architecture and Urban Planning, plans (on paper) have been made to construct parking facilities for 26,000 automobiles on campus.

Lautner believes a reasonable amount of improvement has and will continue to be made on the parking situation every year, but for any full scale construction to begin the State Board of Agriculture must obtain the funds. There are three ways in which it can do this:

(1) Borrowing. In order to borrow money the University has to use it on con-struction that pays for itself such as the dormitories and Olin Memorial Health Cen-

(2) Gifts to the University would supfunds for the purpose, and:

(3) The most important source of revenne is from the State Legislature, Recent legislative cuts in MSU's budget on building makes the outlook in this direction

The main reason why funds are hard to obtain the amount needed to construct the parking areas. For just the gravel surfaced type lot, including the lighting, it would cost on an average of \$50 per parking Asphalt paved lots with lighting, gravel and drainage average \$200 per space and multi-level type lots \$2,250 per space,

Many students complain about the \$5 fee they have to pay to register their cars, but according to Lautner that fee doesn't even pay for the interest being paid for the

space they use.

Lautner said, "If the student paid what the University pays, it would cost him approximately \$15 to \$20 a term to park." tHe is referring to dorm students who store their cars on campus 24 hours a day. Payment for parking by married students is included in their rent.)

According to Hahn, as long as the parking situation remains critical, the Morrill Hall and Ag Hall parking lots reserved for faculty and visitors will be on first come first serve basis.






