Byrd Dies: First to Fly tiutt gave a highly creditable Both Poles .

BOSTON (P) - Retired Rear Adm. Richard E. Byrd. USN, the first man to fly over both the North and South Poles, died Monday. He was 68.

The pioneering an explorer, who had been named over-all head of the Navy's huge "Operation Deep Freeze" in Antarctica, had been alling with a constitution overall months.

Bird was decorated Feb. 21 with the Defense Department's Medal of Freedom. The presentation was done quietly by Adm. Arleigh Burke, Chief of Naval Operations, who flew into Boston, made the award and immediately returned by air to Washington.

Foremost among the world's air-explorers, Byrd was instrumental in charting some two million square miles of the earth's surface previously imseen by man—a feat unequalied in history.

Byrd was born in Winchester,

Byrd was born in Winchester, Va. He has a brother, U. S. Sen. Harry Byrd, Virginia.

Graduating from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1912. Byrd was forced into early retirement by a leg injury, but came back to serve in two world wars, to pioneer in naval aviation and to command the first multi-engine plane to fly the Atlantic—continent to continent—non-stop.
