Despite the surface look of victory over the Egypian-Syrian Bloc Forces, the king faces serious and imminent strength as a leader and "Lib-erator" of the Arab World de pends on holding his fragite Arab alliances fogether. For Jordan to slip through the ring now would be a severe blow to Nasser's Arab Mond.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden m_A legal expert of the Swedish Atomic Energy 'ommission and a former Navy draftsman were formally charged Monday with espionage for "a foreign power" - meaning Soviet Russia.

The indictment accused the AEC expert, Robert F. Dam-stedt, 29, and draftsman Gosta T Jakobsson, 35, of conspiring ship out blueprints of Swedish submarines. It made no mention of any transmission of

atomic secrets.

'They are people with somewhat extravagant drinking habits who talked a little bit too much about things they intended to do, but may not have done it." a foreign office spokesman said. "These men have confessed the police that they intended sell these blueprints to the

The Swedish law on espionare is no broad that mere substantiation of prosecutor Werner Ryhninger's contention that Jakobsson took the blueprints to his hume would be conclusive.

Damstedt and Jakobsson were arrested April 1, opening another round in a stormy exchange of spy charges and countercharges between Russia and Sweden since World War II.

Three other Swedes were indicted with them for failing to report the 'blueprint case to Swedish authorities.

The Soviet Union, no match for the big Western powers in surface warships, is concentrat-

for the big Western powers in surface warships, is concentrat-ing on expansion of its submar-ine fleet, already by far the world's largest. A team of NATO experts headed by U.S. Vice Adm. James M. Thach Jr., reported only last fall that Soviet ship-yard workers were completing three new submarines every two weeks.

These swell a fleet which Jane's Fighting Ships authoritative British reference work on world navies, said numbered not less than 400 at the start of 1956. Some of the older craft

of 1956. Some of the older craft are war booty from Germany and Italy. The Soviet units run in size from 161-ton coastal submarines to long-range craft of more than 1,300 tons.

Among the most smodern of Sweden's 27 subs are siz schnorkel-equipped, fast-diying 800-tonsers turned out lest year.

Sweden protested to Moscow last month against Soviet espionage in this traditionally neutral country. The protest was coupled with rejection of a Soviet complaint that 14 spies for Sweden had been found—and sentenced—in Russia.



Afghanistan Policemen In Course

Six police officers from Afghanistan are among the 33 registrants for the 21st Basic Police Training Course being held now through May

The Afghanistan policemen, members of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the other officers from 17 Michigan cities are receiving instruction in the basic elements of the redice profession.

That letter threatened atomic destruction for Norway incase of war if she permits NATO to locate guided missiles and atomic bases on her territory. Authoritative Norwegian sources have said the Soviet threat against this northern flank of NATO is backed up by L500 planes, 530 naval craft and six to eight army divisions close to Norway's Arctic Frontier. In his reply, Gerhardsen did not touch on the question of equipping Norwegian forces with ganded missiles and atomic weapons by NATO. He told Bulgamn Norway was carrying out her proclaimed intention of not permitting foreign forces to be stationed on her soil in peacetime. peacetime

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
