The problem can be traced to a set of completely befuddled and ambiguous election rules drawn up by AUSG.

According to the election rules a first term senior could run for the office of senior class president but he would not be allowed to vote in the election of the senior class president.

WASHINGTON (P)-Sen. Purtell (R-Conn) said Sunday he "doubts very much" that a proposed "right-to-work" amendment will retard the passage of civil rights legisla-

"I believe there will be some civil rights legislation," he said, "because if we are going to start adding such an amendment as is proposed, there may be other amendments, which other people can add, that may not be quite as attractive to those who advo-cate right-to-work amendments."

In the Senate Judiciary Com-mittee two weeks ago, Sen Mc-Clellan (D-Ark), an avowed for of the civil rights measure, of-fered a right-to-work amend-ment which would outlaw labor agreements requiring employes agreements requiring employes to be union members.

McCleilan said later that if adoption of the amendment killed the civil rights bill, "it would be a service to the country."




