The British-Egyptian talks will open in Rome May 23. Macmillan did not define their scope. Other British officials, however, said they will range over the entire field of financial claims and countreclaims arising out of the Suez crisis.

Macmillan's government advised British ships early last month to steer clear of the canal, opened by a UN salvage fleet after more than three months of work. Only two or three ships flying British colors had disregarded the advice.



A large university has the task of educating thousands of students and therefore must organize itself along the lines of a things. To clarify your terms for your terms. factory. If we are to educate the masses with complete equality this is the only way

Perhaps we are not being realists when we say that such a system, although fine for a large industry, is not particularly ood for a university.

For one thing we must think not only of the process of educating. We must remember what we are trying to produce.

Manufacturing automobiles is quite a different objective than manufacturing educated persons. General Motors can develop one design or mold and fashion their cars to this. The end products will be identical and for the most part good. This is a highly efficient system for business and experence has proven that it is a desirable sys-

The question is how good is it when applied to education? Do we want to produce identical products, even if they are flaw. less? Should the graduates of our universilies be carbon copies of each other, fashioned in the same mold or by the same de-

America's educational philosophy has andered far from the classical idea of education, in which the student is taught how think for himself by establishing a broad background of knowledge.

the heads of our students, give them a general idea of how they should apply these essentials, "spoon feed" them through four years of college, give them a piece of paper be handled rather efficiently in the "fac-tory" situation. It allows thousands of peopie to receive degrees annually and affords equal" opportunity to all.

It's a product of our democratic philosophy which demands the right of everyone to a college education. Quality suffers for quantity. It is dificult to say if this is right wrong. Surely this philosophy has boosted the American standard of living and pro vided this country with the technological know-how necessary to become one of the leading nations in the world.

Mass producing educated people may be the right answer for the U.S. and perhaps the factory system is the only way we can do this. We may have to accept it but we don't have to like it. And if we do accept it will, sooner or later, have to stop rationalizing and admit that although necessary, the assembly-line education is infer-



Hagerty Comments On Speech

Press Secretary Interviewed on TV

WASHINGTON (P)-White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said Monday night President Eisenhowers' television and radio address on the bud ot will be "an attempt to straighten out" what Hager-ty called "a lot of misinformation kicking around."

mation kicking around."

Commenting on the President's nationwide address scheduled for tonight, Hagerty said:

"He (the President) would expect he would get support from everyone in this country — including members of Congress."
Hagerty said the President has no plans to travel "to take his program to the people." He said he could not say for sure whether the President would in the future ask for television and radio time to discuss administration proposals in addition to the scheduled speeches on the budget and foreign aid.

Hagerty was interviewed on a television program (ABC Press Conference.)

The Press Secretary said that "as an old newspaper man. I think the Secretary of State is perefectly correct in his judgement" on banning the entry of American newsmen into Communist China." 

Chessman's attorney also con-tended that his client's rights were violated because Chessman was not permitted to attend the court hearings at which Fras-ier's transcript was studied and made legal. Nor, Davis said, was Chessman at any time in-formed he should have an at-tended to the hearings.

William M. Bennett, deputy attorney general for California, told the court that Frasier's actold the court that Frasier's ac-curacy as a reporter had been established. He said Frasier was chosen for the job not because of his relationship to the prose-cutor but because Frasier and Perry had long worked together and used the same old Pittman system of shorthand.

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
