America Rebukes Trade Act

'Total Embargo' To Continue Here

WASHINGTON (A)-The United States mildly rebuk-ed Britain Thursday for junking special controls or trade with Red China and announced emphatically that "total embargo" on Chinese Communist commerce.

The British action, announced in the House of Commons, contituted the worst diplomatic defeat Washington has suffered from London since Britain joneed France in attacking Egypt

Officials here said private Officials here said privace; that the effects of the wide open split on British-American relations are unpredictable but will depend on the extent of hostility aroused in Congress.

The British announcement, by design or otherwise, was timed to hit Washington when Congress was inactive because of Memorial Day This could have been eaclusted to reduce an instancous flareup of anger at the Capitol.

The Eisenhower administration, which has been struggling for many months to induce its allies to maintain more rizid trade controls on China than on Russia, abandoned its campaign to hold the line once the British decision was made firm.

Officials said that other major trading nations now had no choice but to follow the British lead.

Since 1955 Michigan State's enrollment has increased by 2,000 students. There has been a corresponding increase in full time instructors (not administrators) of 83.

What do the figures mean?

In fall term 1955 there were 16.63 students for every instructor. In fall term 1956 there were 17.17 students for every

In other words, every member of Michigan State's faculty now has to teach one more student than he had to a year ago.

In order for MSU to keep its present student faculty ratio constant the university 17 students who enroll in school. It might be interesting to compare MSU's student teacher ratio with other colleges and universities throughout the country.

In 1955 the University of Michigan had 19/296 students enrolled and a full time faculty of 1/2%. For every member of the

In the same year Ohio State enrolled 22, 508 students and bired a faculty of 2,295 to give them a student-faculty ratio of 9:9. Penn. State, another land grant university like MSI, had a student faculty ratio of

9.9 in 1955.
In the Ly League Dartmonth, with an enrollment of 2,904, has one full-time faculty member for every eight students; Princeton has one full-time faculty instructor for every 78 students; Yale has a fulltime faculty instructor for every 8.6 students, and Harvard, with an enrollment of 10,364, has 3,120 faculty members to give them a student-faculty ratio of 3.3.

It is hard to draw any valid conclusions from these statistics. Michigan State is be-hind Ohio State and Penn. State in the number of teachers they have hired. Endowment could be given as one reason for this. In 1935 Ohio State had an endowment of \$10,392,327 as compared to MSU's \$3,988,620. However, Penn. State is not even listed in the World Almanac as having an endowment of more than million dollars.

Michigan State, considering her relativesmall endowment, is on a par with the University of Wisconsin, Indiana and Min-

A land-grant college such as Michigan State in addition to her endowment also receives support from the state and federal governments to help support her. This also should be taken into consideration when comparing her to such an institution as

Harvard with her \$442,000,000 endowment. . The time is soon coming when the MSU administration will have to decide what is going to be done with the money which was received from the legislature recently.

As the budget is made up there will be allotments for new buildings and books for the library and funds for the athletic teams . . . somewhere, though, there will be some mention of how many faculty members are going to be hired for the coming



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

8 'Rebels' Killed in Beirut Riot

Former Premier Seriously Injured

BEIRUT, Lebanon (A) -Political violence exploded in Beirut Thursday, Eight rioters were killed by gunfire and scores of others injured before the Army restored

It was the first serious trouble in advance of parliamentary elections set to begin June 9 in this traditionally pro-Western Arab nation. The elections are looked upon as a test of strength for pro-Egyptian and pro-Western forces.

The rioting flared when troops and police fried to stop a demonstration and general strike led by two former premiers who are in opposition to Premier Sami Soils. The two are Saeb Salam and Abdullah Yafi.

Salam was hit in the face by a rifle butt wielded by a soldier and seriously injured. He suffered a three-inch gash on his face and was taken to a hospital for treatment. The government announced he is under arrest, along with other rioters.

Many Michigan State captains have left playing memories behind, but it will be many years until one will equal the leadership feats of Capt. Jim Clemens of the Big 10 Championship swimming team.

The fleet freestyler was elected by his teammates to the captaincy post before last year's swimming season, and he became the inspiring force that boosted an unrated squad to its first Big 10 title and a third position at the NCAA

At Maine Township high school in DesPlaines, Ill., Jim participated four years on both the gridiron and the base-ball diamond and devoted two years each to basketball and swimming, while also receiving top academic honors.

As a center of his prep school eleven he helped his team to the conference championship in 1952. During the spring he handled the keystone duties, and was a definite factor in his team's drive to capture the conference and district titles

In his junior season Jim became interested in swimming and starred with present teammates Gordy Fornell and
