Political Careers

Legislative experience is be-coming less and less important for governors, according to find-ings by a political scientist at MSU.

MSU.
Surveying political careers of all state governors from 1870 to 1950, Dr. Joseph A. Schlesinger found that the proportion of governors who had state legislative experience dropped from 65 per cent in 1870 to about 41 per cent in recent years.

He said legislative experience appears to be less of a factor in becoming governor in the West than in the East.



Army Rocket Is Satellite

WASHINGTON (A) Sen Smathers (D.Fla) Monday proposed a Senate Investigation to determine "the reasons for our failure in keep ing pace with the Soviet Union in the development and perfection of the satellite, rocket and Intercontinental Ballistic Missile programs."

He made the suggestion He made the suggestion in a letegram to Sen. Russell (D-Ga), chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, Smathers wired Russell at his home in Winder, Ga, and asked that Russell immediately con-vene the committee for an in-

quiry. Sep. Symington (D-Mo), a

Son. Symington (D-Mo), a member of the committee, has also called for an investigation. The Soviet Union recently announced it had developed an intercontinental Ballistic Missie (ICBM). Friday it sent up the world's first earth satellite. Smathers and the Soviet Union is engaged in a major effective of the source of the satellite.

Smathers and the Soviet Chion is engaged in a major effort to produce the ICBM in large numbers.

"As of the moment, it is clear we do not have such an advantage and the time we may have is uncertain," his telegram to Russell said.

Russell said. The Florida Schator said it is extremely important to find out whether American failure to keep up with the Soviets in the ISBM, rocket and satellite fields "result from inter-service rivalry, a false-economy program, failure in the services in the serv

alry, a false-economy program, failure of the congress to provide sufficient appropriations or insufficient emphasis being placed on these programs by the executive branch of government."

Answers to these and other questions, Smathers and, about the obtained "in an atmosphere shorn of complaceacy and hysteria but within the immediate future."

If the senate decides to investigate U. S. missile progress, one witness may be Dr. I. M. Levitt, a noted authority on out-

Levitt, a noted authority on outer space.
Levitt said in Philadelphia
Monday the army could have
launched its big Jupiter C mis-

sile into outer space as a satel-lite last year except for "ar astonishing piece of stupidity."

"The Penlagon chose to ignore the fact that we had a device capable of launching a satellite and decided to develop another," the scientist said.

He added that the defense partments position was that "the partments position was that the Jupiter was designed as a mis-sile, not a satellite launcher, and that work on the missile— as a weapon—should continue."

"This of course retarded the

satellite program. It may have speeded the missile program; I don't know. But it certainly let the Russians score an astound-ing propaganda victory over the United States."



FOOTBALL THROUGH THE AGES

The football frenzy is upon us. But let us in the mid-t of this pandenonium call time. Let us pause for a moment of tranquil reflection. What is this great American game called football? What is its history? Its origins?



First of all, to call football an American game is somewhat misleading. True, the game is now played almost exclusively in America, but it comes to us from a land far away and a civilization long dead.

Football was first played in ancient Rome. Introduced Football was first played in ancient frome. Introduced by Julius Caesar, it became one of the most popular Roman sports by the time of Nero's reign. The eminent historian, Sigafoos, reports a crowd of MMCLDDXVIII people at the Colosseum one Saturday afternoon to see the Christians play the Lions.

With the decime of the Roman empire, football fell into-disuse. The barbaric Huns and Visigoths preferred canasta. Not until the fifteenth century A. D. did football emerge from its twilight and rise to its rightful place in the firmament of European sports.

Which brings us to September 29, 1442, a date dear to the hearts of all football lans. It was on this date, according to the eminent historian Signfoos, that a sixteen-year-eld lad named Christopher Columbus tried out for the football team at Genoa Tech. He failed to make the team because he was too light. (He weighed at the time only twelve nounds.) twelve pounds.)

And why, you ask, is this date—September 29, 1442—
so dear to the hearts of all football fans? Because young
Columbus was so heartbroken at not making the team
that he ran away to sea. And if that hadn't happened,
he never would have discovered America. And if Columbus
hadn't discovered America, the world would never have
discovered tobacco. And if the world hadn't discovered
tobacco, football fans never would have discovered


But the game took hold in the American colonies and thrived as it had never thrived before. Which brings us to another date that remains evergreen in the hearts of football lovers: December 16, 1773.

On that date a British packet loaded with tea sailed into Boston barbor. The colonies had long been smarting under the English king's tax on tea. "Taxation without representation," they called it, and feelings ran high.

When on December 16, 1773, the British ship dooked at Boston, a semi-pro football team called the Nonpareil Tigers, coached by Samuel (Swifty) Adams, was serim-maging near the harbor, "Come, lads," cried Swifty, see-ing the ship. "Let's dump the tea in the ocean!"

With many a laugh and cheer the Nonpareil Tigers followed Swifty aboard and proceeded to dump the cargo overboard in a wild, disorganized and abandoned manner. "Here how!" called Swifty sharply. "That's no way to dump tea overboard. Let's get into some kind of formation."

And that, fans, is how the tea formation was born. Double your pleasure at next Saturday's game by taking clong plenty of Mariborus, whose makers bring you the column throughout the school year.
