It's Official: LA Gets Dodgers

Coast Assured
Of 2 NL Teams

NEW YORK (AP) - The Brooklyn Dodgers finally made their long-awaited move Tuesday. They definitely are going to Los Angeles in 1958.

seles in 1958.

The official announcement, made at a press conference by Public Relations Director Arthur (Red) Patterson, was so anti-climactic that Walter O'Malley, the club president, don't even bother to attend. He was at a meeting of the club's board of directors.

Patterson's announcement, contained in one brief printed statement, said simply that in view of the action of the Los Angeles City Council Monday, the Dodger stockholders had unanimously agreed to take the necessary steps toward drafting the Los Angeles territory from the Pacific Coast League.

The City Council Monday endered, by a 10-4 vote, the prepared contract between the city and the National League club which would give O'Malley the 100-are Chaves Eavine side for a ball park in exchange for Brooklyn-owned Wrighty Field in Les Angeles.

next year and New York will
have none. The New York
Giants committed themselves
last Aug. 19 to move to San
Francisco next season.

The Dodger announcement
was greeted with mixed reactions on the part of all interestdepartness. In Los Angeles, Mayor Poulson hailed the coming of
the Doxigers and Giants as a
"tremendous boost to California's economy and its position
in the sports world.

The team, incidentally, will
still be called the Dodgers, according to Patterson.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (49)-India called on the three world atomic powers Tuesday to express joint willingness to suspend tests of nuclear weapons as a first step toward disarmament in the new "international planetary age."

John Scott Opens '57 L-C Series

"Time" Publisher Discusses Asia

Speaking to a near-capacaudience in Fairchild Theater, John Scott, world traveler and currently special assistant to the publisher of Time magazine, presented his first hand view of "U. S. Foreign Policy in Asia" Tuesday night at the opening of the 1957-58 Lec-

ture-Concert series. Scott, just returned from a four-month tour, centered pri-marily in Asia, stressed the point that the United States would do well to de-emphasize the military aspects of its policy and concentrate on the eco-comic particularly investments.

and concentrate on the eco-nomic, particularly investments. On the political side he point-ed out that China is the domi-nant force in southeast Asia, in the eyes of the smaller national surrounding her, due in part to the fact that the Red nation has achieved a unity of action nev-er possible among the Western

Locking to the western part of the continent, Scott holds from interviews with both Israell and Arab supporters that a solution to the problems in this area can be brought about with the help of the West.

Following these statements about specific regions he enum-

about specific regions about specific regions he enum-erated two axioms about the overall Asian policy: First, the United States must realize that the retarded countries there look to us for the capital needs for industrial development just as we received help in our nation-

infancy. Secondly, Scott claims that Secondly, Scott claims that Secondly, Scott claims that the U. S. policy-setters had bet-ter realize the fact that democ-racy won't work in retarded countries (i.e. those with a lit-eracy rate of less than 50 per See L-C SERIES, Page 3.

MSU Faculty To Hold Meeting

Anti-Reds Order **Soviets Out**

As San Marino Crisis Declines

SAN MARINO (A) - The anti-Communist provisional government in this tiny republic delivered an ultimatum Tuesday to the rival Communist regime, whose strongman showed signs of wavering.

Federico Bigi, unofficial premier of the provisional government, said the ultimatum contains " a diplomatically worded request for complete surrender." He said the Reds must reply to it by 6 p.m. (1 p.m. EST) to-

day.

Bigi refused to say what would happen if the Communists rejected it. Instead, he said he thought it would be accepted. "I am optimistic," he told

Moments earlier the Red strongman, Interior Minister Domenico Morganti, told a news conference he expected a peaceful settlement of the San Marino crisis within 24 hours.

His comments, and the general atmosphere in this country of 13,000 inhabitants, made it appear that the Reds would step down and leave power to the anti-Communists.

"Really we have no choice

"Really we have no choice "Really we have no choice because we have been under siege by an enormous force of foreign troops." Morganti said.

At the start of the crisis eight days ago, Italian troops sealed off the borders of the country, surrounded by Italy.

U.S. to Follow **Previous Policy**

WASHINGTON (AP)-Nikita Khrushchev's proposal that earth satellites brought under international control drew an American rein effect: Take the matter up with all the United Nations-not just the United States.

The Communist party boss said in Moscow that Russia would be willing, as part of a general U. S.-Soviet agreement, to put an international leash on satellites and missiles.

In reaction, a State Department spokesman said the United

ment spokesman said the United States stands on the Aug. 29 dis-States stands on the Aug. 29 dis-armament proposal made by the four Western members of the UN disarmament subcommittee— —the United States, Britain, France and Canada. Russia, the fifth member of the subcommittee, rejected this proposal which had been made

as an integral part of a disarm-ament package.









