Hynek told a news conference the satellite is being affected by the unknown force as its orbital plane "apparently is turning faster." This, he added, prevents an electronic computer from determining the orbit accurately on the basis of normal gravity conditions.

The scientist said that the earth magnetic field appears too small to account for the overall effect on Sputnik.

He said scientists cannot explain now what is affecting the Hynek told a news conference

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 14 (49)-The 1957 Nobel Peace Prize was awarded Monday to Canada's Lester Bowles Pearson, who helped stop the fighting in Korea and the middle east.

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Yugoslavia Recognizes Red Regime

East Germany Has New Position

BONN, Germany (P) -Yugoslavia chilled the west's hand on the German unity issue Monday. The foreign office announced President Tito's red regime plans to recognize Communist East Germany Monday.

It was a slap in the face for the Bohn Republic and a challone to the solid front the estern powers have built upcated the Soviet bloc against outs Grotewohl's Moscow-allied

otto Grofewohl's Moscow-alliest overnment.

A formal break threatened in relations between Belgrade and Bonn. Chancellor Konrad Ade-ranet's West German Govern-ment has declared it will cut aplomatic links with any nation exchanging envoys with the Red rulers of the 18 million East

Adenauer's government, which recently granted a 380 million dollar, 99-year loan to Yugo-slavia and agreed to pay 60 million dollars in war reparations, recognizes only the Soviet Union among nations having diplomatic ties with East Germany.

The foreign office announce-ent came after a four-hour ceting between Dusan Kveder,

Belgrade's ambassador to Bonn, and Deputy Foreign Minister Watter Hallstein.

The meeting resulted from a Bonn protest condemning a communique issued last month in Belgrade by Tito and Polish Communist leader Wladyslaw Communist leader Wladyslaw Communist new Bonn approving the Oder-Nesse line as Germany's east-

The line now separates East Germany and Poland. Beyond that line lie territories of Silesia.

German.
Tito's response was totally unexpected here.
Relations between Bonn and Belgrade have never been remarkably good, but they have been relatively friendly and West Germany has become Yugoslavia's biggest trade partner.

Tito's new move shifts him farther into the Russian orbit. Renefiting from millions in American aid he has been balancing delicately between the east and west for a long time. The western allies steadfastly have denied the legal existence of East Germany. They consider it the Soviet zone of Germany. In Monday's announcement, the Bonn Government said Yugoslavia has decided to recognize the so-called German Democratic Republic." 



UNLIKE ANY OTHER collegiate sport cross country has

become the most misunderstood competitive sport in both its purpose and scoring. Many sport followers when hearing the word "cross

country" immediately draw a blank impression. People have labeled the distance running event "the lone-

But the big fault lies in the public's misinterpretation

of a sport that dates back to the days of the Greeks.
Because there is no blocking, tackling, passing or intermission spectacular people respond with the question, why

LIKE ANY OTHER competitive contest, cross country demands a certain amount of sacrifice and rigorous conditioning on the part of the runner in order to withstand the grueling ordeal of a four or five-mile race.

Contrary to the bulkiness of a football player, those taking positions at the starting line are slender individuals. With the exception of dual meet competition, entries

number between 60-90 runners.

Each participant has been taught how to pace himself, control his rate of speed and how to utilize his reserve stamina in a close test.

THE FIRING OF the gun sends these runners in quest of conquering a four-mile course and the scaling of numer-

What makes cross country an interesting sport is that it makes the individual decide on a definite course of action. Out on the course the contestant alone has to outline his plan of attaining victory. He doesn't have any teammates to block the opposition; he has to make his bid early in order to cash in at the finish.

At Michigan State top coaching and talent combine to form the best cross country aggregation in the nation. Probably the biggest misgiving is the fact that the pub-

lic doesn't have an idea of how the scoring of cross country meet is derived.

The winner of a cross country meet, like a golf match is designated by the lowest computed score.

IF MICHIGAN STATE has tallied 15 points and the opposition has netted 47, the victor is Michigan State.

Also if the Spartan harriers were to take the first seven places in a meet they would receive a perfect score of 15 points by adding up the first five positions. In a dual meet the lowest possible score is 15 points

with the highest possible 50 points.

If Michigan State took the first eight places, the eighth place automatically goes to the opponent, no matter where the opponent finishes under the NCAA ruling. As an example, if Michigan State finished 12 men before the first Notre Dame entry, the Irish would automatically get the


