

# Soviet Leaders Speak To Reporters at Afghan

MOSCOW (P)—Nikita S. Khrushchev said Tuesday night the Soviet earth satellite is a good thing—and Deputy Premier Anastase Mikoyan said the fact that Egyptian troops are in Syria is a good thing, too.

Both leaders talked to report-ers at a reception in the Afghan Embassy

Mikoyan, with Premier Bulganin standing by and nodding agreement, gave the first official Soviet resetton to Syria's use of Egyptian troops.

"They are brother nations and it's a case of one brother coming to the assistance of another brother who feels himself in difficulties," Mikoyan said.

"We (Bulganin- and Mikoyan) have just talked to the Egyptian and Syrian ambassadous. They are both pleased about it, and there is no reason why we should not be pleased about it too."

Khrushchev, the Communist Party chief, did not comment on Syrian developments. Reporters asked what he thought of Sput-





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
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
