# Pentagon **Opens Door** On Missiles

**Jupiter Finishes** Test Successfully

WASHINGTON (P)-The Fentagon, in announcing the firing of a Jupiter intermediate range missile Tuesday night, opened slightly the door of secrecy which has shielded the hush-hush missile testing program.

This announcement was the first time there has been official word identifying any type of rocket launched at the Cape Cañaveral, Fla., testing center. In the past, a mouncements have been limited merely to confirmation that a firing took place.

The Defense Department not only said the Jupiter had been fired but gave a brief summary of the results. It said the Jupiter flew "its prescribed course" and hit in the "preselected target area."

However, the Pentagon would not go so far as to say how far the Jupiter traveled. It said that was secret information.

NEW YORK (A) - An American Army sergeant said Tuesday he is still on duty and drawing pay four months after he admitted to the FBI that he had been a hired Russian spy.

Master Sgt. Roy Rhodes, testifying at the spy trial of Russian Col. Rudolf I. Abel, said

sian Col. Rudolf I. Abel, Said he never had been arrested, in-dicted or courtmartialed. Ikhodes added, however, that he is confined to the Virginia Army Base where he currently

is stationed.

The bomb in the USIA library exploded during the siesta hour when the bunding was empty. The other explosions occurred only a few minutes apart in Cholon, Saigon's twin city.

BONN, Germany, (A) — Konrad Adenauer, 81, was elected to his third term as West German Chancellor Tuesday, but feuding among his supporters delayed formation of his cabinet.

The lower house (Bundestag) formally re-elected Adenauer for another four years 274-192. There were nine absentions. His confirmation had been a foregone conclusion ever since his Christian Democratic Party won an absolute majority, in the lower house in the Spt. 15 general election. He has held office without a break since 1949, when the West German Republic was founded.

Differences arose over who should hold some posts, and especially over the future of former Finance Minister Frit Schaeffer. 
