Palestine Division **Anniversary Nears**

EDITOR'S NOTE: Nov. 29 will mark the 10th anni versary of the United Nations Resolution for the parti-tion of Palestine. The following article was written by Gil Kollin, National President of the Student Zionist

Organization in commemoration of that event,
On November 29, 1947, the General Assembly of the UN
passed the distoric Palestine Partition Resolution which passed blackbeteric Palestine Paritism called for the division of Palestine into two independent states, one predominately Jewish, the other predominantly Arab. This resolution, passed upon by better than a two-thirds majority of the member nations of the UN, including a property of the member nations of the UN. ing the United States and the Soviet Union, gave universal assent to the establishment of the State of Israel. This decision reflected the post World War II recognition of the tragedy of the Jewish people who had lost 6,000,000 of their faith to Hitler, and recognized as well the epic* advances of the Jewish settlers in Palestine who had begun reclaiming an ancient land from long neglect.

The UN decision awarded to the Palestinian Jews only a section of the land originally intended for the Jewish State under the terms of the League of Nations Mandate to Great Britain. Nevertheless, pressed by the impulse to-wards independence and the necessity for absorbing tens of thousands of refugees from many parts of the world, the Jewish representatives accepted unconditionally the terms of the UN resolution.

History records the unfortunate fact that the neighbor ing Arab States announced at the UN that they did not feel bound by the resolution and then further declared that intended to drive the Jews into the sea.

When, in May of 1948, under the terms of the UN decision Israel was established, six Arab armies, five of them member nations of the UN, promptly invaded Palestine, The Israelis defended their new state with epic heroism. Some of the territory intended for an Arab State was an nexed by other Arab nations. A small portion of this land was gained by Istael in the course of the bitterly fought

Ten years have passed since these events moved the hearts of men throughout the world. In that time Israel has grown from a nation of 600,000 to one of 2,000,000 free men gathered from the four corners of the worldthe survivors of persecution from Hitler to Nasser.


Israel's developments in social welfare, education, science, agriculture and government has established it as the single modern, stable, progressive nation in the Middle East. Although surrounded by economic blockade, and subjected to military threats, infiltration, sabotage and murder, Israel continues to play its part as a modern nation, a friend of those who value freedom and human dignity.

It is astounding to recall that 60 years ago, practically


to the day, Theodor Herzl addressed the First Zionist Congress in Basle, Switzerland, with the prophecy that within 50 years there would be a Jewish State. Practical men, thoughtful men, thought him mad. Israel's hope today, that the future shall see peace and cooperation between the Arab States and Israel to the betterment of the life of all the peoples of the region, may seem equally insane, UN Partition Day, however, is a reminder that the finest aspirations of man may yet find expression and that hope, rather than despair, can be the portion of mankind.





Spain Clashes With Morocco, Troops to Reinforce Colonies

MALRID, Spain (P)—Spain's relations with Morocco were near the breaking point Monday because of bloody clashes in because of broody Chertes is Spoin's West African colonies. Spain has sent reinforcement to the colonies from the Canar Islands, her former protectoral in Northern Morocco, and free Sevilla in southern Spain, reliable informacks said. Fifteen Heinkel Bombers also left Sevilla a few days ago for West Africa, it was reported.

Diplomatic sources said Spain has asked the United States Unitervene with King Monamuse. V of Morocco to secure with-drawal of Moroccan Liberation Army forces attacking Spain's Irm and Rio de Oro colories.

The Spanish believe the stakes in Rio de Oro, especially, are high. They believe oil deposits found in Libva and Algeria continue into Rio de Oro.


