

OSU, Minn., Share MSU Traffic Woes

The problem of park and pay that is stirring up con-troversy throughout the MSU student body is not unique at this Big 10 institution.

Two other schools - namely Ohio State University and the University of Minnesota are also experiencing diffi-

The Ohio State Lantern in an editorial dated November 19 discussed the pros and cons to a newly proposed set of parking regulations scheduled to take effect in Columbus during the Winter Quarter.

The new parking plan will carry a tariff of \$4 for students to park their cars on campus and between \$5 and \$10 for faculty members' cars according to the location of

Registration fees will be initiated for the first time this

winter. Up until now parking had been free.

Student suggestions to relieve the problem of parking 14,000 registered cars in the 6,100 parking spaces available on the Ohio campus ranged from a monthly rate system to the banning of freshmen driving and keeping persons who live within a 10-block radius of the campus from

The Lantern editor takes the view that it is an "unfortunte but necessary" situation and that if the burden isn't unloaded on the students it will just "drain off the already

insufficient faculty salary appropriations."

Meanwhile at the University of Minnesota, Howie Martz reports in The Minnesota Daily on the proposed contract parking to commence during the Winter Quarter.

Three parking lots with a capacity of approximately 250 cars will be put into use and will cost each student that uses the space \$15 per quarter.

Parking at present is limited to 3,000 spaces and Min-

ota has "a commuter population of 60 to 70 percent of the total enrollment.

Alternatives offered for the contract plan and submitted to the All-University Congress' Student Services Commission were: "Deny to certain groups the privilege of parking on campus. For example, freshmen could be denied parking facilities." "Encourage greater use of car pools" and "Encourage the use of public transportation by suggesting that persons living close to bus lines use the bus."

The immediate problem that arises under the contract plan is that of who will get priority on the limited space? Commuters?, residents of dormitories, fraternities, sororities or boarding houses?, or should it be first come first

Although the commuter problem at Minnesota is unique in comparison to MSU grievances and the price range for registration is different at OSU, the parking problem is not one for MSU students alone.

This 'Auto' Do It

The traffic problem is rapidly fading away. A few words by President John Hannah (See page one story) brushed aside the red tape, empty arguments, and hopeless student screams quickly and easily. It is now just a matter of going through the mechanics of changing the regulations.

Just where the credit lies for bringing about this sudden change is a matter for speculation. On this score we feel the credit should go to Marne Gleason, President of Student Government. He has staged a one man caper which was a thing of beauty. Similar in some ways to a bull in a china shop but effective nonetheless.

Gleason got little support from the rest of the so-called student leaders on campus, it was little Marne who finally stepped out in front and led the student body to a new MSU. We hope this is not a flash in the pg.a.



Administration Reveals Plan For 1958 Labor Legislation

- The Eisenhower Administration Thursday took the wraps off its 1958 labor legislation program aimed at smoking out crooks and racketeers from the labor movement.

It includes provision for full disclosure of union funds, secret ballot election of union officers, tightened bribery restrictions and broad recommendations for revision of the Taft-Hartley

The program was outlined in detail by Secretary of Labor Mitchell to the second constitutional convention of the AFL-CIO. The federation executive board will take up the program at its meeting Tuesday.

Mitchell said later the program has the approval of President Elsenhower, who saw it as late as Wednesday, and that has been discussed with Republican leaders of both the House and Senate.
