WASHINGTON (P)-Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin undertook to steal President Eisenhower's State of the Union thunder Thursday by sending the President a massive 38-page message calling for an East-West summit conference to discuss major world issues.

The carefully timed maneuver demonstrated the kind of fast political - propaganda footwork by the Soviet Government which many of America's allies wish the United States would show on osasion. European leaders have been critical of what they conceive to be a lack of boldness and imagination in U.S. tactles in dealing with Russia.

First Challenge in Months

Mac's East-West Proposal Embarrasses Soviet Bosses

Britain's Prime Minister Macmilian appears to have contrib-uted an important service to the Western cause in the cold with His proposal for an East-West nonaggression pact provided the first real challenge to Moscow in many months, and apparent-by it embarrassed the Kremb

The experience of the Marmillan proposal is likely to point

Kremlin's Hand Forced

Macmillan made his proposal last week in an address to the British nation. His action was positive, for a change, instead of the usual negative Western pol-icy of-waiting for Soviet propa-

icy of-waiting for Soviet propagarda proposals and then simply labeling them as such. This has left the initiative in the Kremin's hands over a long period.

The Soviet press and radio were quiet about the Macmillan proposal for days, suggesting a waiting period was in order, to digest if and come up with an effective response. Now the Soviet press has begin to cavil about it.

The Soviet Union is seeking a summit meeting of heads of

national problems on a potent propaganda platform, but it is not seeking agreements as such. The prospect of a concrete produced posal, indeed, seems to frighted the Kremlin.

Moscow is promising now not to "export revolution." It has no intention of exporting Communism to Africa and Asia atthis stage of the game. An international agreement pegged to ironciad guarantees might cramp the Kremhn's style.



Eisenhower Supports Plea

Senator Johnson Requests Faster Missile Production

WASHINGTON (A)-Sen. Johnson of Texas, Democratic leader of the Senate and chairman of its preparedness subcommittee, called Thursday for an increase in the produc-

tion of ballistic missiles. He said the testimony of three military experts who have ap-peared before his subcommittee at closed door sessions indicated

at closed door sessions indicated production rates for these space age weapons should and could be stepped up.

Johnson referred to Lt. Gen. James A. Gavin, retiring chief of Army research and development. Geh. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, and Ma). Gen. Bernard A. S. hriever, director of the ballistic missiles program for the Air Force.

Schriever's testimony "encouraging."
