

Democrats Enjoying 'A Happy Dilemma'

DEMOCRATS ARE IN WHAT could be called "a happy dilemma" in which they are latching onto both ends of the most important issue in the world.

At the Paris show, the Republican Administration was compelled to put forth a peace issue, and on President Eisenhower's initiative. That's about all he could do. It was plain that Secretary of State Dulles was reluctant, and painfully so, to give any pleasure to the Russians. In fact, it might be said that he was figuratively at missile-point.

Even the missile issue itself was vague. Not only was it uncertain, and subject to later negotiations in the case of most of our NATO allies, but the President himself went over his Secretary of State's head on disarmament. He left two alternatives on disarmament negotiation — first through the UN and, if the Russians are not amenable, at the foreign ministers level.

IT WAS A HAPPY INSPIRATION on the part of the President to inject the peace note at the 11th hour; otherwise he would have lost the opportunity.

That gave the Democrats their opening to follow up with negotiations so that a positive issue could be made from the NATO sessions. The issue then was, in effect,

Even in advance of the NATO sessions we saw the Democrats, including Adlai Stevenson, not only stressing economic issues and trying to deemphasize the military aspects, but also sounding out new negotiations with the

But Democrats got even more than they had bargained for. After it was all over we found that NATO on one hand and the Russians on the other were ready to act as negotiating parties. Further than that, NATO was recognized for the first time as an alliance through which to bargain with the Russians.

Dulles was clearly at the tail-end of this parade at the NATO meeting, so that the President found himself aligned with a new deal-internationally speaking-in an effort to resolve the cold war.

AT THE SAME TIME the Democrats, because of their management of Congress, can constantly push the initiative in their theater of defense. They can buttress our defense and that of our allies with the result that we can have the best possible basis on which to negotiate with the

In view of our allies' patently vague commitments on missiles, Democrats, with few exceptions, now find they must rely upon themselves to get the best in that field of defense until such allies as we have can stand by

It is clear that Dulles could not have known how far our position in the alliance deteriorated psychologically in the short time between the first Russian sputnik on Oct. 4 and the NATO session itself on Dec. 16. Our allies had taken another look at themselves, and some of them were not sure at all about locating missiles in their territory

If President Eisenhower did not know how quickly the situation had changed, he certainly found out at the NATO sessions. In fact, it might be debated whether negotiations with our allies and the Russians had come to be paramount or whether the missile issue had become secondary

Dulles found himself in an almost right-about-face. He certainly could not have been in a very comfortable posi-tion. Obviously, our policy is in for an overhauling.

We certainly changed our signals while the team was in the midst of play.

Forget Some of Your Income, But Make Sure It's Tax-Free

There are certain types of income which are tax-free, and which you don't even have to report in making out your income tax return. By taking advantage of these exclusions you may be able to whittle down your tax bill considerably.

On the other hand, you may have had certain income which you hadn't thought of as being taxable. The government wants you to exclude everything possible under the law, but the tax collectors also insist that every bit of taxable income be listed. This article deals with both types of income.

Generally speaking, payments made in the form of scholarships on fellowships are tax exempt. If the recipient is a candidate for a degree the entire amount is tax free and needn't be reported. If the recipient is not a candidate for a degree, the maximum amount which is exempt is \$300 a month.

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Ambassador Llewllyn Thompson came home from Moscow Sunday to report on his efforts to arrange talks between the United States and Russia. He said he does not seem to have made any pro: gress so far.

Thompson will report to President Eisenhower and Secretary. of State Dulles

His return coincided with aronly is standing firm on all its oft-rejected proposals for East-West negotiations but may in fact be hardening its position and raising its terms.

Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev said Russia would diseuss Eisenhower's recent pro-posal to Premier Nikolai Bul-ganin for a ban on outer space weapons and warfare only if the Western powers agreed to all of Russia's major disarmament de-mands.

These include dismantling U.S. military bases abroad, the reduction of foreign forces in Germany and other European countries, an immediate ban on nuclear weapons are well as the testing of such weapons and the creation of an atom-free zone in central Europe.

A strip of black plastic may pave the way to producing blanched asparagus commercially in Michigan and other vegetable areas in northeastern. Instead State

MSU Research reports indicate that the black plastic material may eliminate the need for ridging soil and cut costs in white asparagus production.
