What Are Schools Really Turning Out?

LET'S TAKE A LOOK at education—ours. There is, as we all know, a minority of students anywhere who have the capacity and desire to learn and to think. It is a part of this talent to question and inquire.

Just as the teenager battles his parents for his independence, so the outstanding, thinking college student bat, tles society for his right to think, to inquire, to live.

This is a small group. These are the leaders of our intellectual life. If they chip conformity's walls, we should repair it and forget it. This does not happen here.

The number of students at this school who simply pack up and move on because of pure unadulterated disgust is not large in relation to the total student body, but in relation to the number of really talented people we have, one is too many.

The personality of outstanding ability does not lend itself to red tape, filling out the same forms every term, term after term, or to being treated as though he was incapable of reason or of possessing any moral fiber.
POINTLESS SOCIAL STANDARDS irritate these peo

ple. The yean't stand television, Memory tests leave them unimpressed with their teachers or the school.

One think piles on another and finally they go home, or try another school, or skid row, or just throw all their books away and start delivering mail or shoveling coal.

The question is, what do we do about this kind of person? The head shrinkers say they are not "adjusted." That may be, but just what is "adjusted?" Does it mean warped

We are turning out in masses, "adjusted" members of society. But . . . and a big "but" are we brainwashing and twisting personalities to make thing run smoothly or are we turning out educated people?

The final question is: can you exist as an individual in our society without wearing a buckle in the back?

This Is Freedom?

THE MICHIGAN COUNCIL of Churches recently endorsed a bill to be introduced in the State Legislature which would, if passed, outlaw most types of retail sales on Sunday. An MCC representative said his group believed the proposed law would be "the most satisfactory means of preserving the traditional meaning of Sunday and of ending this gross commercialization."

It seems strange indeed that in a country set up to preserve freedom of religion the churches themselves are becoming lobbyists for legislation which would, in effect, remove Sabbath Day temptations from before the masses and leave them little to do Sunday morning except to go to church or sleep. A few more steps and church attendance may become compulsory!

It is fine to be able to live in a nation where anyone can go to the church of his choice—or damn religion altogether he so chooses. It won't be fine at all if we suddenly find church and state united in a stand against non-religious practices which might tend to detract from church at-

Going a little deeper than the Protestant leaders who proposed the bill did, the "traditional meaning of Sunday" certainly must be preserved-by opposing exactly the sort of legislation they have suggested. The meaning of Sunday in a country such as ours is a day set aside for worship-for those who wish to take advantage of it. For those who don't, there should be freedom to live in the way they desire, just like the other six days of the week. And speaking of commercialization, what's the difference

between a dealer who keeps his store open on Sunday a church which tears down all barriers that might hurt

Nothing can be gained by forcing a "tradition" on the people, and besides the dissenters can still sleep Sundaysuntil the next law goes through!

Byrd's Quitting A Big Surprise

WASHINGTON (AP)-The Senate must be slipping Sometimes it has seemed that only death or a political knockout could pry a senator from office.

tor from office.

But when Harry Flood Byrd (D-Va) said Wednesday he will not run for re-election this year, he became the fifth senator to reach such a conclusion.

Previously Sens. Edward Martin (R-Pa), who is 78; Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-NJ), 77; William Knowland (R-Calif), 49, and William Jenner (R-Ind), 49, had said they had had it. They gave various reasons—Byrd, for example, has an alling wife—but they add up to a surprisingly large group to leave the Senate voluntarily.






