WHEN THE SO-CALLED "gift stamp" began to flood the American economy a few years back it was seen by some as a near-miraculous institution-a sort of bank whereby consumers could "save" toward long-needed household treasures. By others it was considered nothing more than a form of socialism-forcing every consumer to pay indirectly for his gold, green, red, brown and multi-colored stickers whether he wanted them or not.

In effect the latter was true; the gift stamp people made money—probably at least a fifth of a cent for each token they sold to retailers. The retailers either absorbed this extra burden as part of their promotional structure, thus eliminating that much potential cost reduction, or they tacked the extra cost directly onto their products, Consumers complained.

Eventually these complaints were heard, with the result that some retailers, notably gasoline stations, have arranged an option system whereby consumers can save stamps or money as they please.

THE IDEA IS to set up pumps calibrated at a base price "without stamps" and others at one cent per gallon more "with stamps." Indications are that the low-rate pumps far outsell their stamps-included counterparts, but still there are those who pay the premium and maintain their 'savings accounts.'

This is the way it should be—provide the "easy way to earn free gifts" for those who are interested and reward those who aren't with lower prices. Grocery stores, the main suppliers of gift stamps, could easily arrange a stan-dard percentage discount on cash register totals for buyers who didn't want stamps.

It seems probable that the great American institution of bonus stamps would fall into obsolescence rapidly when shoppers discovered they could save in more than one way, but this would only happen in response to public demand. In this particular matter it would seem far wiser to let the customer be always right, at least in deciding how he

Here's the Way Others See Supervisory Role

Dressmakers on Strike

First Time In 25 Years For Ladies

Wages, Contract Cause Walkout

NEW YORK (A)-For the first time in 25 years, dressmakers Wednesday launched a general strike against the billion dollar a year garment industry. More than 105,000 walked out in nine eastern states.

eastern states.

With a new generation taking over the work benches since the lost strike, many of the dress-makers never walked a picket line before. The striking International Ladies Garment Workers Union used sound trucks to brief them on the almost forgotten mechanism of a strike.

Wages and contract enforcement were the chief issues in the walkout, which got under way at 10 a.m.

Most of the industry's Easter finery already had been delivered to the nation's dress shops. A prolonged walkout, however, could throw out of kilter summer and fall production schedules.

As 65,000 dressmakers—mostive women—left the lofts in New York's cluttered garment district to march on Madison Square Garden for a strike rally, Mayor Robert F. Wagner said he might cut short a Bahamas vacation.

The Mayor sent word that if the strike continued beyond 48 hours, he would return and force both sides into marathon bargaining sessions. Meanwhile, Wagner promised protection for picket lines, but warned both sides against violence that char-acterized garment strikes of long

The ILGWU is a rich union and it reported 33 million dol-lars on hand to finance a walk-out of whatever duration.







DAMASCUS (P)—Syria's intelligence chief accused Arabia's King Saud Wednesday of masterminding what he called a multimillion dollar plot to wreck the new United Arab Republic and kill President Gamal Abdel Nasser. He said 'file United States knew about it.

President Nasser himself reported a bribery plot had been in the making but he' did not link King Saud or his government with it.

There was no immediate comment from Saudi, American or other sources outside the Egyptian-Syrian-Yemeni union and the rival Arab camp.
