Reject Taxes, Bond Issues

Donations Build \$600,000 Public School

COLUMBUS, Ind. (UPI)—Those self-reliant folks here in Bartholomew County have dug down in their jeans again and built themselves another school.

They didn't resort to anything as common as raising taxes or floating bond issues.

Everybody just reached in their pockets—and kept reaching until they came up with enough money to erect the 12-room elementary school their kids needed. Built at a cost of about \$600,000, the building is being used for the first time this term.

It took just two matter-of-fact meetings with school officials before nine local industrial leaders handed over \$364,500 to help out. The rest of the money was borrowed reluctantly from the state's veterans bonus surplus fund at one percent interest.

Passing the hat to meet community needs is nothing new for Columbus, a south-central Indiana factory town of 23,000. In fact local citizens have earned a nationwide reputation for being—as this saying goes around here—"as independent as a hog on ice."

Columbus first tried do-it-yourself school building methods in 1951. They hadn't constructed a new school since 1924, and a rapid population growth since World War II had left teachers submerged in an ever-increasing flood of pupils.

In two weeks, contributions amounted to \$375,000—largely from business and industry—and the new grade school was built.

But that drive was like a sneeze in a tornado compared to the one that resulted in the new gymnasium in 1952.

Everybody knows a Hoosier would rather play or watch basketball than be turned loose in Ft. Knox with a wheelbarrow. Columbus made up its civic mind to build a new gymnasium.

Campaigning to raise \$750,000 began on Dec. 10, 1952. Everybody worked at it. Rural residents joined right in with city dwellers.

Two weeks after the campaign started, on Christmas Eve, the citizens of Bartholomew County found themselves with quite a Yuletide present—more than one million dollars.

The gym, an impressive edi-

torium of stone, brick and glass, has been in use four seasons now. With 2,300 seats, it's the fourth largest in Indiana.

We don't plan to have a gift drive every time we need a new building," explained Luther Lockwood, Columbus school superintendent.

"This has been an emergency stage, and from now on we hope that regular taxes will do the

job. But it sure is nice to know people can be counted on if anything does go wrong with ordinary methods."

Small Community Survives Accidental A-Bomb Release

FLORENCE, S.C. (UPI)—The first community ever known to survive an atomic bomb drop unscathed got the bad carpet treatment Wednesday from the Air Force.

The bomb did not set off a nuclear explosion when it landed into the earth in a sparsely inhabited section five miles east of here Tuesday night. The TNT charge which triggers the nuclear device damaged six houses and a church and injured six persons, some seriously.

High ranking officers visited

through ankle-deep mud of the Mars Bluff community in surveying damage done by the errant A-bomb that dropped accidentally from a B-47 jet bomber.

A malfunction of the bomb release mechanism, the Strategic Air Command said, let the bomb slip.



Brody Radio Slates All Campus Hookup

Lansing Group Offers Grant; Program Content to Vary

WBRS, the Brody Radio Service, may soon be broadcasting on a campus-wide basis.

James Denison, administrative assistant to the president in charge of public affairs, stated last week that it could be assumed the Federal Communications Commission regulations would be broken if the would have no objections to the proposed expansion.

Assistant station manager in charge of public relations, Glenn Hartman, Pontiac sophomore, said that necessary funds had been offered by a Lansing group to the station in the form of a grant.

According to Hartman, the grant, which would have to be accepted through the State's Board of Agriculture, was previously requested by Denison's predecessor in approving the plan.

His own feeling was that since the station would serve the students, the students should pay.

This system is now in effect with dormitories receiving WBRS being assessed 25 cents per man annually.

Hartman asserted that WBRS has been presented professional help in solving all problems which might arise in expansion. This includes programming, legal advertising and any technical difficulty unanswered might involve FCC regulations.

A task force to the university said that these regulations must be complied with, so the station could be issued a construction permit.

Actually, if a task force was issued, it might consider all licenses held by that institution at that time or any time in the future, the attorney continued.

The FCC has established a formula limiting the amount of radiation wired radio stations may diffuse. This is to eliminate interference with licensed wireless stations.

A proposal now under study to require all wired stations to obtain an FCC license. However, under present conditions, WBRS plans to expand so much that the FCC would not be concerned, the legal advisor stated.

Hartman said that when final plans were approved by the administration, WBRS would begin to expand. The first step would be to seek the old State News office in downtown Lansing. This would give the station a central campus location.

He then went on to say, "If everything goes right, we could be in operation campus wide by next fall." WBRS has been operating since spring of 1957 with the entire Brody Corp. now receiving the station.

Programming includes sports, interviews, music, both popular and classical, and various announcements. Since the station is non-commercial there is no advertising.

The signal is transmitted via an antenna, direct into the living units, thereby eliminating static. At least 150 stations are numerous, approximately 200 operating in U.S. Colleges, Both Western Michigan College and the University of Michigan have wired radio stations.
