

#### **African Race Topic Now at Crisis Point**

A MAN CAN MAKE only one great discovery, Gilbert Keith Chesterton once said, namely, that there are other persons in the world besides himself.

Nowhere in the world does this message more aptly apply than the Union of South Africa where Afrikaaner Johann Strijdom and his white supremacy government rule the roost with an iron fist.

Even in the most decadent district in Dixie there has developed a conscience to bar the excesses of bigotry. Even in Soviet Russia, with its slave labor, the evil is not social inequality, but political suppression.



But in South Africa with its semi-fascist leanings, the non-white has been deprived of the few privileges he once enjoyed and now lives in a state of deject poverty and starvation.

In the Transvaal where conditions are the worst because government policies are the most strictly enforced, one marvels that the Negro population, which far exceeds the whites, has not yet resorted to bloody vioin combatting the Strijdom regime

Pres. JOHANNES STRIJDOM

THE ALMOST UNBELIEVABLE PACIFISM which has thus far contained the anguish of the oppressed majority shows signs of wearing thin at this point after getting no where with quiet pleading tactics. Cape Town and Pretoria, both Transvaal metropolitan areas complete with networks of Shanty-town communities, may soon be scenes of a mass protest strike action,

The ideal solution to the South African headache, though, would be to have Strijdom toppled in the general election to be held April 16. Strijdom's opposition, the United Party, has long been planning such an event. Enter Sir de Villiers Granff

As the leader of the United Party, Graaff is described as "a barrister, farmer, and sportsman, a man of jolly, easy-mixing disposition," the exact opposite of austere Johannes Preceded by a distinguished line of United Party liberals

including Boer heroes Gen. Louis Botha and Field Marshall Jan Smuts, Sir de Villiers Graaff inherits the party reigns at a time when a social reform campaign could conceivably lead to a victory at the polls. While Negro voting eligibility is denied, there are a

great many Afrikaaners who object strenuously to the present Prime Minister and his cabinet—enough perhaps to

Their feelings were expressed when white students at the University of Pretoria staged a group protest to ban-ning Negro students, a Strijdom move. Author Alan Paton voices the sentiments of many Afrikaaners in "Cry, the Beloved Country" (Paton was recently imprisoned for con-

After having lived in South Africa and grown accustomed to the highhandedness of Prime Minister Strijdom, many Afrikaaners doubt that he will be willing to chance a free election which could result in junking all his die-hard policies. His next move will likely be to discard the election outcome on a technicality or to tamper with the ballots'

Either way it looks as though Graaf has a rough fight on his hands and the best policy will be to fight fire with fire.

GEORGE SZYPULA'S THIRD of an office in the physical education department at Jenison Gym is becoming smaller and noisier and busier the closer Friday and Saturday, the days of this year's NCAA gymnastics championships, draw near.

Between teaching assorted phys ed classes, serving in his 11th season as MSU gym coach and performing the hundred and one duties of director and host coach for the collegiate title meet, Szypula scarcely has time to voice

his personal enthuiasm over the coming event.

But once you catch him with a minute to spare, ease his ever-jangling telephone off the hook and move the record-breaking number of NCAA entries (some 150 performers from 33 schools) to the back of his desk to allow better

vision, it's not at all hard to get him started talking.
"This'll be one of the most talented groups of athletes you'll ever have the chance to see under one roof," says Szypula, who at 36 can still demonstrate the athletic prowess that won him five National Collegiate and AAU turn-

bling titles during his undergraduate days at Temple.

In attendance, he points out, will be Penn State, de-fending national champ; Il-linois, 1957 runnerup and current Big 10 titlist; Army, which defeated Penn State in a dual meet this season. and a half dozen strong dark horse contenders — among them the impressive Spartan squad.

Geographic representation for the meet is "splendid," according to Szypula, with entries coming from such far flung areas as California and Massachusetts, Arizona and Slippery Rock (Pa.). All Big 10 schools except North-western and Purdue will

send teams.
Included in the long list of individual stars who will compete are 1957 NCAA champs Abie Grossfeld (horizontal bar), John Davis (side horse) and Frank Hailand (tumbling) — all Illinois gymnasts. Three other '57 titleholders defending their crowns are Tom Darling of Pitt (flying rings), Garvin Smith of Los Angeles State (rope climb) and Glenn Wilson of Western Illinois (trampoline).

Add to this list a host of regional meet champions—



#### Iran's Shah **Terminates** Marriage

Sorrow Shown As Ruler Signs

TEHRAN, Iran (49)—The Shah of Iran tearfully signed Saturday night the final papers officially ending his seven-year marriage to young and beautiful Queen

A court announcement said the divorce papers will be delivered to, Senaya in Cologne, Germany, today and that the Shah may remarry within 100 days But a court source said it would be longer than that, before the saddened Shah takes another, bride, his third.

The main step in the divorce of the childless couple was taken a month ago in a traditional religious cremony. The

taken a menth ago in a fradi-tional religious ceremons. The long delay between that and the final signing (registration) had led to speculation that a re-concilation might be in the

Wind.
But apparently following the word of his royal advisors, the 38 - year - old ruler carried through his divorce of the 26-

year-old queen because she failed to give him a male heir to the throne, Sources close to the Shah and Soraya said they still love each other but that the Shah was duty bound.

A court source said the Shah was extremely sorry and had tears in his eyes when he signed the papers. The Shah has not hidden his sorrow about the breakup of the marriage. He told his people recently.

This decision is one of the most difficult I have always forgotten my petsonal affairs for the sake of the country since I succeeded to the throne.
