

Before dawn youthful gunmen poured onto the streets of San-tiago, a focal point of Fidel Cas-tro's 16-month-old guerrilla movement, with hopes of setting the spark for a general strike and open civil war.

## **Appropriation Cuts** Peril State Services

AS THE UNEMPLOYED roam the halls of the State Capitol building in Lansing, Walter Reuther of the UAW calls for a cut in auto excise taxes to boost buying and employment, and a spring upturn is predicted for the na-tion's business recession, MSU is faced with operating on a budget which is \$1 million under its 1957-58 appropriation and \$2 million under what it feels necessary to conduct university affairs.

Although every university department has been hit with recommended cutbacks in funds, two state agencies indi-rectly connected with the school face perhaps the most dire financial peril as a result of appropriations reductions.

The Labor Relations Center did not even rate mention as to its itemized budget in the Senate bill providing for MSU appropriations. As opposed to the method used in the past, this year the center will have to draw from the lump sum of \$25,315,000 given for university operations.

Senate bill 1335, appropriations for the state library, the Law library and the network of more than 250 public libraries throughout the state of Michigan will supply \$840,-000. This drastic reduction cuts the 1957-58 appropriation by \$270,000 and represents a 25 percent slash in library

The Labor Relations Center serves both labor and management with research and educational programs. Dr. Charles C. Killingsworth, director of the center, feels the services offered to the people of Michigan are fundamental to the growth of knowledge and educational techniques and basic to the idea of a landgrant college. President Hannah has actively supported the center saying that \$191,000 is needed to operate it, and that he would do everything possible to preserve it, even if added funds had to be taken from the reduced lump sum.

Thus far this year a staff of 11 professors, a lecturer and an instructor have presented 120 programs for nearly 6,000 persons. Killingsworth has taken the cream of the country's crop of labor experts who have had the higher learning and experience necessary to work with leaders in in ustry and labor. He is faced with the problem of losing these valuable men and the state is faced with losing their services if the budget does not provide for the center's active continuance.

The state library system is faced not only with the problem of operating on a short budget, and losing highly trained library personnel through cutbacks, but also with losing a \$145,000 federal grant which can only be obtained if the state appropriations are more than last year's fig-

If the state appropriation is below last year's mark, one million persons in rural areas will be without library services. Mrs. Thomas F. McAllister, chairman of the state board of libraries explains the problem in detail:

"We are faced with doubled demands for services." Mrs. McAllister says, "Book prices are up by 30 percent and we cannot buy a backlog of titles due to lack of funds of the present budget. Unless the 1958-59 budget is increased, we cannot possibly meet these demands. We might just as well lock the door and throw away the key."

A cut in the funds for a library system which serves 5 million people could result in forcing the suspension of state library operations for six weeks, according to Mrs. McAllister.

These two important service functions of the university and the state carry out programs vitally necessary for the education and progress of Michigan.

Shortsightedness now will definitely impair these services and prod our educational system backward in quick
