Rebels Within Sight Of U.S. Naval Base

Castro's Forces Reported **Suffering Heavy Casualties**

HAVANA (A)-Fidel Castro's rebel forces carried their guerrilla warfare to within sight of the U.S. Naval Base at Guantanamo in eastern Cuba Monday.

The rebels shot up Caimanera, a sugar mill town of 6,000 persons on the west side of Guantanamo Bay. There was no immediate report of casualties.

Caimanera is near the northern outskirts of the U.S. Naval Base in southeast Oriente Province.

HAVANA P: — A yacht load of Cuban rebels from Mexico has landed on the southern coast of Pinar Del Rio Province and, under army harassmeht and, under army harassmeht, scattered into the nearby moun-tains. The landing obviously was aimed at opening a diver-sionary western front for rebel leader Fidel Castro.



We took a trial run with the showboat crew last week.

The acts we saw were good. They needed polishing. They needed the costumes, lights and props that they would have at the final production, but they showed a lot of promise.

The acts ranged from a modernized version of Macbeth to a 1920's style dancehall. They included a lampooning of familiar Grill characters, burial of "Pore Jud" of Oklahoma fame and a Sunday afternoon in the park, complete with poodle.

Even at this rough stage of the program, it looks well worth the 90 cents cost of the ticket. There is a good deal of comedy in the acts. They show that there was an amount of thought and planning put into them. On the whole they look as though they weren't just "thrown together."

In at least one sense, Showboat is more than just a show, it is a challenge. Showboat is a this-year-only replacement for Spartacade, which has a long tradition on campus. Because Showboat is new, it does not have this acceptance. It does not have the "smart to be seen at" tag that Spartacade, Water Canival and Junior 500 do.

The attendance figures will indicate whether Spartans go to a production because they are following the leader or whether they try things out on their own.

The show is good, it deserves an audience. Whether it gets one or not depends on each student individually because the "leaders" will not have a chance to decide for the "crowd" whether or not it is socially smooth to be seen

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
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

High Court Will Rule Contempt

WASHINGTON (A)-The Supreme Court agreed Monday to rule on a challenge to the power of the House Committee on Un-American Activities to compel testimony from recalcitrant wit-

The ruling when it comes could end once and for all the dispute over the impact of the court's Watkins decision in June 1957.

On the other hand, the appeal of Llovd Barenblatt from his contempt of Congress conviction might be decided on some nar-

row ground. In its June, 1957 decision, the High Court reversed the con-High Court reversed the con-tempt of Congress conviction of John T. Watkins, Rock Island, Ill., labor organizer. Chief Jus-tice Warren, author of the main opinion, criticized the House resolution setting up the Com-mittee on Un-American Activi-ties for, what he called uncer-

mittee on Un-American Activi-ties for "what he called uncer-tainty and vagueness.

This led to some contentions, particularly among lawyers for contempt of Congress defend-ants, that the Walkins decision invalidated the resolution and thereby left the committee without authority to bring contempt

thereby left the committee without authority to bring contempt
proceedings.

Three times, however, the U.S.
Court of Appeals here has sinceruled that the resolution was not
invalidated.

Barenblatt, former teacher at
the University of Michigan and
Vassar College, refused in June
1954 to tell the committee
whether he had been a member
of the Communist party or had
ever been a member of the Haldane Club of the Communist
Party while in Michigan. He
was convicted of contempt of
Congress, sontenced to 8 ix
months in jail and fined \$250.

The Barenblatt case will not
be argued before next fall.
Hence it will provide no new
guides for the Court of Appeals
which late this month will bear
arguments in nine contempt of
Congress cases.
