

Are Bigger Classes Effective Classes?

A RECURRING TOPIC among those involved in education is the problem of class sizes. Cramming the students into classes, some say, while increasing efficiency, tends to mass-produce individuals into well-adjusted machines.

Others, such as the Fordham University research group in New York, maintain large classes are every bit as effective as smaller ones. They base their statements on a year of study and experimentation. Other research groups, however, come up with opposing views as to whether or not larger classes yield unsatisfactory results. A Columbia University study, for example, concluded recently that "more educational creativity exists when classes are small, and promising new procedures are more rapidly adopted."

But the crux of the problem thus far has not been emphasized in any important studies. Rather than concentrating on the hypothetical "average" or "normal" teacher, the studies may produce more convicing—or at least less conflicting—answers to the question by assuming that while some teachers perform better with large classes, some are more effective with smaller groups.

Lectures, for example, obviously work as well with 100 people as with 50. The problems involved in making lectures effective do not involve the size of classes so much as the teaching approach (such as mere repetition of text material as opposed to detailed concern with background

Research groups could put more of a light on the classsize problem by seeking to determine what types of courses work best in lecture form, what types are most effective when handled in small discussion groups, and so on.

Lumping each and every education course together, then trying to find whether or not one generalization holds for all of them, seems to be a case of barking up the proverbial

Had the content of the letters been pertinent to the case, and used as evidence, perhaps papers should have printed in the name of the public's right to know.





All candidates running for the office of President of the AUSG must have a petition with 100 legal signatures.

A student may sign any number of petitions for candidates in his district or class.

In the case that the number of students residing in a district are not of sufficient number to provide the required signature for Student Congress members the elections commissioner will accept petitions from the district with as many signatures as it is possible to obtain.

If less than two petitions are submitted for each class office or for student congress the elections commissioner will re-open petitioning for an extra 48 hours.

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

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
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
