Freedom of Press Limited by Dulles

MORE THAN A YEAR AGO, on March 4, 1957, the passport of William Worthy, correspondent for the Baltimore Afro-American, expired.

He immediately applied for a new one. For almost seven months the State Department weighed his request and finally, on Sept. 18 turned it down.

The reason given was that Worthy had gone to Red China and Hungary against the Department's wishes and would not promise to stay away from news in countries where Secretary Dulles doesn't want news covered.

Worthy filed a protest with the Department's Board of Passport Appeals, From October until the very end of March the board leisurely considered the matter; then came Dulles' decision. No passport.

Worthy is still unworthy because, as Dulles told the American Civil Liberties Union, his travel "would seriously prejudice the orderly conduct of U.S. foreign policy."

The delay in answering the renewal request and the appeal is inexcusable and a form of penalty; the reason given for the rejection again pinpoints the alarming misconception Dulles has of the role of the press.

Newspapermen, he maintains, are in business to further the aims of the Secretary of State, i.e., U.S. foreign policy.
It is hard to believe that in a democratic country a view is perilous as this can survive a test on constitutional

Fortunately, the case will now go to court, where we will find the answer not only to this question but also to the large question of the State Department's right to control the movement of American citizens. It is time we knew just how free we are.



(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of stories dealing with All-University Student Government elections rules and procedures as provided for in Student Congress bills No. 7 and 8.)

Aldates for the legismic title to the legislative branch must be a resident of that district.

4. A student having less than three terms remaining before them shall not be eligible.

All candidates for the legislative branch, class officers and president of the AUSC must meet the following requirements or be disqualified.

1. Have and maintain a two point grade average with a min-

point grade average with a min-imum of 12 credits. Exceptions to this are first term freshmen

2. Freshmen must have be-tween 0-42.5 credits to be el-igible to run in that class, soph-

4. A student having less than three terms remaining before graduation shall not be eligible to run for any class office of the legislative branch.







the world as the true showcase for comparing the strength of rival communism and democra-cy, declares the chief editor of the city's largest independent newspaper.

The divided city "is the only place in the world where the two different systems can show their real strength," stated Helmut Meyer-Dietrich in an address before the Faculty Men's

Meyer-Dietrich, a visiting lecturer at MSU's School of Journalism this quarter, added that "Berlin is the last camp which holds together the two parts of Germany."

"The city," he continued, "by its mere existence hinders the Communists from cutting off the numerous and manyfold human numerous and manyfold human contacts between Germans from the West and from the East. It would be much easier for the Communists to pervert the truth as nobody knew it." Nuclear weapons are not the means to change communism, the German newspaper official asserted, "though they are badly needed as long as the Commun-

"We never should forget that communism missed one of its main aims, and that is to make people happier.
