## **MSU Civil Defense** Called 'Unworkable'

AS THE COLD WAR drags on, the voices erving for some sort of emergency defense plan, in case of attack, gain strength. Government propagandists are making a stronger push for support of Civil Defense operations. Posters, radio ads and TV spot announcements urge cooperation for defense of the homefront,

The lack of response to these urgings becomes quite understandable when one views the workability of the proposed defense systems.

Even MSU has set up an emergency plan to ready the campus for the possibility of air attack. Designed to alleviate confusion, its final outcome would appear to be more one of mass hysteria.

The method of evacuating the dormitories will well serve as a specific instance. According to instructions given clorm safety chairmen at a recent workshop; in case of danger of air attack (or tornado), the occupants of third floor will be moved to second, those on second to first, and

In most dorms each floor has only one, single-width door, through which both entering and exiting lines would have to pass. The probable result of such "foresighted" preparation would be a state of complete congestion and confusion involving the lives of at least 100 people when

## Hitchhiking Headache?

THE CHARTER AND CODE of the city of East Lansing states that: "No person will stand in a roadway or any other area designated by the City Council for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the operator of any vehicle.

The areas that have been designated as "no hitchhiking" areas include only two. These areas are between the intersection of Michigan and Grand River avenues and Delta street on both Michigan and Grand River, and both areas have legible signs saying "no hitchhiking"

Recent student complaints have implied that hitchhiking is not what it used to be because police restrictions have made it difficult. These complaints further imply that it is necessary to hitchhike because of the strict rules governing tardiness for class."

It can be easily understood, in view of the magnaminity of our campus, that it is easier to ride than walk to class, but this means that it is only less indolent for a person to walk. It does not mean that persons physically canable of walking cannot do so if they have enough time. The only reasons for not having enough time would originate in the daily habits of the complainers themselves.

The complaint that hitchhiking is not what it used to be

is charged by persons who hitchlike consistently en mass. That is, persons who hitchlike in groups of three or more. These indolent, capable, university students even use devjous tricks and abusive language when plying their trade.

For instance, the East Lansing police report that stu-dents having been refused a ride, broke one car's aerial. They also report complaints that students have opened car doors and climbed in without an invitation. Many complaints on this order make it seem apparent

that these things happen quite often and it also makes it seem that it is not the students who should complain of hitchhiking difficulties but the recipients of their abuse.
