
Following Contempt Conviction For Neglecting First Mandate

Teacher Blacklisting Charges Scrutinized

TO THOSE WHO CLAIM academic freedom has been violated within our higher educational system, a recent editorial in The Nation affords added ammunition.

The editorial, prompted by another article by educator

Louis Hacker which was in turn the offspring of the fourth annual observance of Academic Freedom Week, evaluates Hacker's charge that "a virtual blacklist exists in the American University world that is as mean and cruel as

Among the interesting things The Nation's editorial, "Academic Freedom: Some Unfinished Business," had to say concerned the blacklist of those who blacklist. Special committees have reported violations of academic freedom at nine institutions involving the career of 13 teachers,

WHAT STANDS OUT as significant here is that from the nine accused institutions, which include the likes of Reed College, Dickinson College, Livingstone College and Texas Technological College, the only Big 10 school, in fact the only Midwest institution of any note, to appear on the blacklist is our Ann Arbor cousin, the University of Michigan. This brings the issue pretty close to home.

The fact that Academic Freedom Week was sponsored by the National Student Assn., and that both Michigan State and the University of Michigan are members of this organization (MSU on one-year trial basis only) gives indication that this subject may be east in our midst again and soon, whether the involved universities are looking forward to refuting such charges or not.

ALTHOUGH THIS UNIVERSITY did not appear on The Nation's blacklist, recent rumblings from the history de-partment serve notice that this occasion may not be too far away. Just how well-founded charges of academic freedom violation may be, we cannot yet say, but from what we do know, some of those persons involved in the rumblings prefer to point to the university's "austerity" appropriation as the cause of severed contracts (or, to be more correct in the history department case, contracts not

Now, it appears that the typical blacklist case The Nation is concerned with and the situation in which the MSU history department finds itself are two entirely dif-

The loyalty oath cases The Nation seems primarily concerned with are nowadays as infrequent as the 1958 fellow travellers who eight years ago marched in droves before the McCarthy, Jenner, Velde and Clardy congressional committees.

THE NATION in its editorial denounces the loyalty oath obligation certain instructors face "to purge themselves before investigating committees by giving names of asso ciates; and to surrender an important protection against self-incrimination—the safeguards afforded by the Fifth Amendment." The Nation cannot honestly be called illib-

The history department case stands on much more shaky grounds-despite the opinions of some flagwaving extremists. No loyalty oaths are involved here. No coersion of any sort has yet been proved, and until it is, those who feel "contumacy is dead" had better hold their thunder.

On the other hand, if and when such claims can be accepted as more than mere rumor, then it will seem that miasmas do indeed pervade, and that some earnest flagwaving will indeed be in order.
