### Recession 'Worst' Dip In 13 Years

WASHINGTON (P) Several of the nation's top business executives agreed Thursday that the current recession is the worst of the post-World War II economic

slumps.

Fouteen industrial and financial leaders, responding to a Senate Finan e Committee questionnaire, gave more support to a tax cut as an anti-recession measure than to public works.

But most of them urged caution in applying any government remedies, citing a continued risk of more inflation and contending it is impossible to smooth out all economic ups-and-downs.

Elsewhere on the economic front:

1. The House with some re-luctance snouted approval of another year's extension of cor-porate income and general ex-sise or sales taxes at their pre-sent rates. The Sanate is almost certain to go along. The Eisen-hower Administration, says it cannot afford to have the taxes reduced as scheduled June 20. The revenue involved is about \$2,600,000.000 a year.

2. The government reported a rise in new construction ac-tivity last month. It said all types of public and private con-struction totaled \$4,100,000,000

The greatest volume of traffic seemed to occur between 7:45-8:15 a.m. and 4:45-5:15 p.m.

### **Student Government** Fills Various Roles

WHEN ANY GROUP attempts to represent such diverse interests as, say, married men, veterans, sororities, fraternities, dormitories, and independents, it becomes often subject to criticism. Worse yet, it may seem to all these interests to have actually little to do with them. Such a group is the All-University Student Government,

Beyond noticing that there is a Student Government tax Devond noticing that there is a Student Government tax collected at registration each term, many students see nothing of the work of their government. It remains to them a vague group removed from their daily classroom and living routines. However, the concrete achievements of the Students Government directly affect the student in many

Probably the first consideration in viewing the AUSG ear's work, would be the Helot, the handbook which is given to every incoming freshman. This is partially paid

FURTHER ON in the term, the Activities Carnival is given. The tax pays for a portion of this, Each pep rally, is backed by tax funds and Student Government people. Fall term's "Spartan Revue" with Joni James was a Tree entertainment for students, yet tax funds backed this also. As a total, the AUSG Spartan Spirit committee spent about \$4,000 on these events.

In times of increasing world tension, foreign relations In times of increasing with the sending of some MSU foreign students to the United Nations, AUSG also contributed backing to the International Festival held here this term.

Tax funds go to support the mimeograph-and silk screen services given to organizations, and last year, funds were provided to enter MSU into the National Students Assn. The NSA aims to bring together leaders from all U. S. campuses in an effort to promote better higher education.

TROUGH THE CONGRESS Resolutions, the AUSG has a method of bringing to the attention of the administration the wishes of the student body. Last year, such resolutions were presented to the administration regularly.

"Whether or not the resolutions effect any changes di-Whether or not the resolutions effect any changes di-rectly is not obvious," stated present Congress Speaker Lowell Brigham. "The administration might have been planning to make those changes anyway, but we believe that student opinion does have its influence."

The traffic resolutions, and the opening of several parking areas to students are concrete example of the resolu-tion at work. Several lights have been erected on campus through resolution suggestions. The last AUSG-submitted resolutions were about the sewage problem and maintaining the off-campus living age at 21 years.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT Academic Benefits committee was responsible for planning and holding the series of speeches, "Politics—1958," held here. The Junior College relations committee maintains communications with a large number of Junior Colleges, helping them to set up their own government systems, and seeks to sell MSU to the best of these students. At present, and over the last year, a movie is being made about MSU to further this purpose.

The AUSG maintains responsibility for the campus elections, and during the year, much time is devoted by all of the members to such work as distributing ballots, counting them, working on committees to help candidates with their problems and seeing that fair, legal elections are held.

These AUSG functions taken together, with those projects still in the planning stages, prove Student Govern-ment's role to be more than simply a "Mickey Mouse Organization," a term sometimes tagged to it by the unknowing outsider. Rather AUSG has to be classified as the most important link between either the individual or the organ-




