U. S. Orders Halt Formosa Convoy

Peace Attempts Renewed On Red China Cease-Fire

WASHINGTON (P)-The United States Tuesday anounced a halt in its Formosa strait convoy operations and readied an effort to make Red China's cease-fire a permanent one.

The announcement was fore-shadowed by a Peiping radio broad ast which noted an abscence of U. S. warships and aircraft in the Quemoy area. The state department said, however, that the convoying well be resumed forthwith to the extent necessary if Red China again starts shooting at Quemoy.

Liquor Plays Large Role in Fall Election

On Nov. 4 the citizens of East Lansing will decide whether liquor will be sold by the glass within the city

There has been some misunderstanding about what will be the effects if East Lansing votes to open the area to the sale of liquor. How would this affect students at Michigan State?

In the first place, the election is required by state law which says that when a dry city annexes territory in which liquor is sold, the citizens of the city must vote either to permit liquor sales in the city or to refuse the sale of liquor in taverns in the annexed area.

Jan 1, 1958 the city annexed a section of Meridian Township which included three concerns selling liquor.

The East Lansing city charter stipulates that no liquor can be sold within the city limits: However, since Jan. 1. liquor has been sold in these three concerns and the status quo will remain until the decision of the voters is heard next month.

There are two propositions concerning liquor that will appear on the November ballot. The first (to amend the city charter) reads: Shall section 18, part 1 of chapter 18 of the charter of the city of East Larsing entitled "Alcoholic Beverages Prohibited" be repealed?

The second states: Shall the sale of spirits in addition to beer and wine be permitted for consumption on the premises within the city of East Lansing?

Seemingly these two could conflict. What happens if the charter is amended, but liquor by the glass is voted down? The result will be take-out store

What happens if the charter is not amended, but the citizens vote for liquor by the glass? The city attorney has said in this case the vote on the charter would be nullified.

If the sale of spirits by the glass is voted in does this mean that bars will pop up everywhere and students will have no trouble getting liquor within walking distance?

At this time the answer appears to be "No." Again state law covers this. The regulation states that there shall be no sale of liquor within 500 feet of a school build-

The residential zone one block off the main avenue restricts the building of commercial establishments there.

With Lansing on the West side (with their own laws) the only seemingly possible place for barssis east of town, where several are now located. However, the catch here is that while there apparently is no retail zone available in East Lansing for a bar, there would be no reason why new retail zones would and could not be added if liquor concerns pushed for new areas

How are students concerned? If the vote passes to allow liquor sales in this whole area, then things will remain such as they have been since the first of the year. No new tayerns can move in much closer to campus than the ones already established.

However, if the charter is changed by the proposition to sell liquor by the glass is voted down, only carry-out pur-

If both are defeated, students will have to beat a trail outside the city limits.

The University dean of students office is not con-

cerned and does not foresee any problems that would involve the drinking regulations on campus

City manager John Patriarche says the only forseeable advantage of having a wet East Lansing would be that the city itself rather than the township, would have direct controf over tayerns. If the city were dry, the bars would build up at the city limits, out of the restricted area and away from city control. There would be no gain to speak of from license fees.
