Letter Sent By Premier To Algiers

Salan Told of Hope For Free Election

PARIS (A) - Premier De Gaulle Monday told the French Army to get out of politics in Algeria at once
He said his order was to clear
the way for free elections Nov.
28.

The action was De Gaulle's strongest against the military leaders who organized so-called committees of public safety in Algiers after the political-military revolt there May 13. That uprising paved the way for De Gaulle's return to power.

De Gaulle ruled that ne Prench military men or civil servents could be candidates in the parliamentary halloting. He also said persons who had held military or government posts within the post 12 months could not run.

His orders were in a stern letter to Gen. Raoul Salan, French commander in Algeria. De. Gaulle's letter to Salan

DeGaulle said he insisted on holding free elections in which all persons could take part regardless of their political

all persons could take part regardless of their political views.

"The only persons excluded will be those who participate in terrorism and, because of this fact, are liable to prosecution," he soid,

"The best interests of the country demand that the ensultation take pleas under conditions of absolute freedom and sincerting." De Gastle told Ralam, "and that lists representative of all tendencies — I say all tendencies — he allowed concurrently and equally to solicit the suffrage of the electorate."

Asserting he attached extreme importance to a real competition, De Gaulle said the "worst canger would be the formation of lists solely favored by the official authority."



Extension of the Quemoy truce from one to three weeks repersents a victory for American pressure against the use of force to settle political arguments.
