On WKAR's 'Viewpoint'

Political Scientists Predict Trouble For GOP in Congressional Race

Two political scientists gazed deep into their crystal balls Sunday and forecast trouble for the Republicans tomorrow.

MSU professors Raiph Gold-man and John Fenton warned the Democrats, however, not to count their chickens too fast. On "Viewpoint" over WKAR-radio, Goldman declared:

"If the Repulicans lose 25 seats in the House of Representatives, you can call the election a 'draw." If they lose 55 seats or more, it's a Democratic landslide, But if the Repulicans drop 40-50 House seats the mandate

slide, But if the Repulicans drop 40-30 House seats, the mandate will be difficult to interpret." Goldman predicted the third alternative as most likely. Fenton forecast trouble in Ohio for the Repulicans over the Right-to-Work issue. Record registration in this key state, he said, bodes ill for the GOP.

In the first place, he said, the Gallup organization may be using its regular cross-section sample of the nation's voters. Such a sample, he asserted, may be fine for a presidential election, but in an off-year campaign it may tend to over-represent the size of the urban vote. This means that Gallup may be magnifying shifts away from the Republicans in the cities

This distortion, he continued, may be further aggravated by the fact that rural voters in recent years have been shifting into the Democratic column. He-

WASHINGTON (P)-The mation's six biggest airlines Sunday announced a mutual aid pact to share revenues when any one or more of them is shut down by a la-bor strike.

bor strike.

The pact was assounced amid erucial negotiations to settle an 18-day mechanics walkout that has elessed down Capital Alrimes esperations. The mechanics, represented by the International Association of Machinists, have also threatened a strike today of Eastern Air Lines.

Joining in the Aid Pact were Capital, American, Eastern, Pan American World Airways, TWA and United Air Lines. Other air-lines were invited to join.

The big six ostered a energy arresument providing that not extra revenues realized during a strike on any one or more of the airlines will later be returned to these made lelle.

the Civil Aeronautics board.

Siebert Talks at Strasbourg On Freedom of Journalists

STRASBOURG, Prence—"The relationship between the journalist and his source is of such importance to our society that it should be protected by law," an in ter nationally-recognised authority on press law from MSU said here Thursday.

Speaking at a meeting of the International Association for Research in Mass Communications, Dr. Fred Siebert said, "It is the duty of all professional organizations in the field of journalism to agitate for the enactment of proper legislation to protect the journalist from compulsion to reveal his sources."

Dr. Siebert, U.S. representative on the executive council of the international association, is director of the School of Journalism and leads the division of mass communications at MSU.

State News Urges **Everyone to Vote**

TOO MANY AMERICANS talks about self-government as a boon but act as if it were a bore. Too many are saying nowadays, "What does it matter whether I vote? The parties have become so much alike it's hard to choose. Anya few insiders will run things.

That's precisely what "a few insiders" would like citi-zens to believe. Actually one vote has many times decided important questions. Congress rarely has a session without tie votes or decisions made by a single vote. Only weeks before Pearl Harbor one vote saved selective service. And congressmen have been elected by a one-vote margin.

Moreover, there are important choices to be made. Always there is an opportunity to estimate which of two candidates is more able and trustworthy. And despite the effort of each party to be all things to all men there are some broad differences on national issues. Both major parties have left and right wings, but on balance the Republican Party tends to be more conservative, especially about finances

CONGRESSIONAL QUARTERLY has just released figu. es on 63 votes in Congress this year where "econom; could be called an issue. The average Republican congre m n gave twice as much support as the average Democrat to efforts to hold down federal spending. Republicans backed economy only 40 percent of the time, but the average for Congress as a whole was only 24 percent. For non-Southern Democrats it was little more than 10 percent.

Of course, statistics of this kind need to be evaluated. A vote for some big economy could offset several small spending votes. Many citizens would list defense appropriations and other expenditures as investments rather than "spending." Some "economy" votes were to halt pay rises to federal workers or the armed services, to cut foreign aid, education programs, or anti-recession measures. It is plain that much besides economy is involved in many of these votes, but for the record the Republicans were generally more to restrain spending.

THERE ARE OTHER real differences between the parties-especially as between Republicans and Democrats outside the South in congressional districts or states where close contests are being waged. In most cases the Democrats have more labor support (unions are reported to have contributed large sums to Democratic campaigns) and are likely to have more interest in regulating business than unions. Republicans might be expected to be more concerned about inflation, somewhat less ready to support

Citizens having views on these subjects should be able to add up and decide where their preponderant favor falls. Making such calculations is part of the self-development that self-government affords. The responsibility—and opportunity-to make these decisions and register them at the polls is one enjoyed by only a fraction of the earth's peoples. Let it be valued as it deserves.



Angele Cardinal Beneald, Patriarch of Venice, was chosen Tuesday by the College of Cardinals as the new Pope of the Roman Catholic Church. Elected on the 12th ballot, the new Pontiff chose the name John XXIII, a name previously used from

Pope John XXIII designated Nov. 2nd for his coronation. In his first message to the world, he appealed to rulers of all nations to work for peace and turn destructive weapons, inte tools of peace.
