

Proposes Berlin Split

Soviet Aggression May Prelude War

WASHINGTON (P)-The Berlin showdown effort by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will probably carry the greatest danger of all-out war between the Sov-iet and the Western blocs that the world has seen for a long time, Associated Press correspondent John Hightower predicted Tues-

Inigntower predicted Tuesday.

Those are the estimates made here Tuesday of the future significance of the latest moves in Moscow and Western capitals over the fate of divided Berlin.

American officials take aeriously Khrushchev's Monday announcement that the Russiam intend to turn over administration of East Berlin to the communist authorities of East Germany, writes Hightower.

The timing of his declaration may have been determined by interest in fostering Soviet ties with communist Poland. Russian attempts to settle German issues could be construed in Poland as being designed to pave the way for peaceful settlements and a demilitarized zone along the cold war front in Europe, analyzes Hightower.

But the best informed authorities here said Tuesday they had no doubt that in the long run Khrushchew will undertake the serious attempt to force the Western Powers out of Berlin and build up the prestige of the Soviet dominated regime there by making the East German

The United States, Britain and France have occupied the city jointly with Soviet Russia since the end of World War II. and U. S. and British spokesmen Menday night turned down Khrushchev's demand for an end to the occupation.

The State Department reasserted the U. S. policy of fighting if necessary ato preserve Western interests in the city which is entirely surrounded by East German territory.

Khrushchev's latest maneuver had been foreshadowed by East German propaganda attacks on the Western position in Berlin, However, some authorities here see it significantly against a background of failures by the Soviet communist high command during the past year of "Sputnik diplomacy" to "make any really important or prontable gains in the drive to expand Red power, said Hightower.

Williams Assumes 'Governor's Role?'

AS GOV. G. MENNEN Williams surveys his recent unprecedented election victory, we hope that he will remain dedicated to the betterment and welfare of Michigan, and not become distracted by the Presidential aspirations which not become distracted are to the purportedly holds for 1960. If he does, he certainly is entitled to the backing of every citizen.

On Nov. 4, Williams was rouning against an almost un-known Republican (who lacked both backing and financial assistance of his party). But as Williams found out, his op-ponent brought out the main issues, the sad industrial pic-

Williams, who has kept the seat in Lansing for 10 years, won his sixth term with a "comfortable" 139,000 margin. HOWEVER, HE received less than half the plurality confidently predicted by the ClO-Democratic bigwigs, and fell 150,000 below his 1956 triumph margin and 100,000 below that of 1954.

Most impressive, he trailed Democrats running for U. S. Senator and four lesser state offices.

On a day that saw Senators Jack Kennedy, Stuart Symington and others grab prominent positions for the 1960 presidential nomination, Williams, like New York's Averell Harriman, became cold as a possible contender.

A FEW DAYS after his re-election Williams announced that the

that the State was in the doldrums of an economic decline, a fact he conveniently overlooked during the campaign. So he proposed the organization of a committee for economic wth and stability.

During the gubernatorial campaigh, Republican candidate Paul Bagwell was continually referring to the disturb-ing economic situation in Michigan, But Williams seemed to disregard Bagwell's remarks. Instead he told the voting public the state wasn't in an "industrial crisis."

Bagwell's comment after his defeat was probably noticed by Williams. "Although I was defeated, I think I have made the governor a more conscientions of real problems facing Michigan," Bagwell said

In addition to a program which will had the state eco-omically, measures must be taken to correct the base deficit of \$80 millio

ALSO, DESPITE the defeat of the proposed constitu tional convention; there must be considerable refo amendment to modernize and streamline an sub-

Michigan and Gov. Williams are going to be living to gether for another two years, therefore good relations should be maintamed

The governor should not go around blasting his critics as "smearers of Michigan." He must realize that his critics have a right to big stakes in Michigan, too, and there is no advantage in waging a bitter war with his political op-

ments. Because of the large Democratic election victory, Williams will have to contend with many other Democratic politicians if he hopes to realize his purported White House

leviating the economic decline must be the primary pix of attack. The future of Michigan is in the hands of Wi Hams. His competency as a governor will be tested.



Electronic Brain Sets Records No Coffee Breaks In 14 Work Hours If MSU had a "rookie of

the year" award for an out-standing newcomer, a top candidate would surely be MISTIC, short for Michigan

State Integral Computer.

The big electronic "brain" has been known to work continuously for long stretches—up to 14 hours at a time—without even a coffee break.

In spite of a stack period during the summer when many researchers were on vacation, MISTIC has put in an average of 35 hours a week of steady work, not counting time out for repairs, some "rehearsals." and an occasional musical rendition an occasional musical rendition of "Waltzing Mathilda" made possible through the gift of a special feed-in tape from oper-ators of MISTIC'S sister at the

University of Sydney, Australia.







Titles for State?

MICHIGAN STATE'S rapidly improving cross country am will take to the road Thursday to defend its Big 10 and IC4A titles with an excellent chance of successfully accomplishing this goal. A convincing win in these two championships would make the Spartans the most dangerous challengers for top honors in the NCAA meet on November 24.

But let's not look too far ahead, for Iowa and Indiana stand in the way of a Big 10 crown and the IC4A boasts entries from over 30 Eastern colleges and universities.

When the Spartans make their way out of Bartlett Gym onto the Washington Park course in Chicago Friday, they will find an unbeaten Hawkeye squad led by Deacon Jones who has matched his team's record of no losses. Indiana, another contender for the title, tied a strong Notre Dame team just last week. The Spartans defeated the Irish in a iangular meet 21-37 two weeks ago.
MICHIGAN STATE'S Forddy Kennedy, captain of the

arrier squad, will be seeking revenge this year against Minnesota's Bud Edelen, who edged the Spartan runner in the league championships last year by a few feet with a time of 21:09.4. Kennedy's only other challenger will be Jones, who defeated Edelen last week in a dual meet be-

tween the Hawkeyes and the Minnesota Gophers.
In the IC4A meet last year, over the Van Cortland Park five-mile course in New York City, Kennedy bounced back from his defeat at the hands of Edelen and won the race with a 24:14.8—the second fastest time ever run in IC4A history. Henry Kennedy, Forddy's brother set the mark in 1956, when the Spartans completed a "grand slam" for the season. A grand slam in cross country is composed of wins in all three major meets—the Big 10, IC4A and NCAA championships.

Veteran runner Bob Lake has been running in his usual good form and will add to the Spartan attack. Last year Lake took fourth in the Big 10 and finished seventh in the

CAA on the basis of a 25:03 performance. FOR BILL REYNOLDS, this will be his first Big 10 outing, but the sophomore runner took fourth against Penn State with a 25:49 timing and edged Lake in the triangular meet with Wisconsin and Notre Dame to take third place.

Tony Smith, a regular on last year's squad, ran his best time against Penn State also. Smith earned eighth with time of 26:45. He posted a 23:08 time in the last year's

Dave Lean, who captained the track team last spring, was not running too well in the early part of the season



but has come along. Lean, who ran cross country last year for the first time, will be pushing Smith and Jim Horan. Horan is a runner who also has been slow in developing

but recently has been turning in very good performances for the Spartans. He placed even higher than Smith in the Penn State meet, running the five-mile circuit in 26:42.

SIDELIGHTS: Michigan State will be seeking its fourth straight Big 10 crown Friday and its seventh in eight tries. Last year's winning score of 43 points was impres-sive but it nowhere approaches the Big 10 record set by the Spartans in 1956 of 21 points

Anderson, who played his collegiate backetball at Stanford University, was elected "coach of the year" by the Chicago Basketball Writers Assn. for his outstanding work as head coach of the Great Lakes Naval Training Station squad. He compiled a 32-5 record in this season in the Navy.

In 1948-54 Anderson built Bradley into a powerful banket-built aggregation, Min Brave beams took one Sugar Bowl plannie, finished person four times and fourth once in na-tional tournaments.

Anderson completed his final year with a second place standing in the NCAA finals.

After two "average" seasons, Anderson piloted State to a share of the Big 10 title and fourth position in the NCAA finals.

After losing the first three conference games of the 1936-57 season, Anderson took his Spartans from rags to riches by sweeping through the remainder of the season with 10 straight wins.



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
