MSU Grid Turmoil **Should Stir Change**

PROBABLY THE biggest mystery in college football this year is MSU's rapid decline as a national powerhouse. But neither the newspaper sleuths nor the director of MSU's athletic plant. Biggie Munn, would shed positive light on the source of Spartan football troubles.

Athletic Director Munn's statements ("It was the most futile display I've ever seen." "Utter futility." "When you futile display I've ever seen. Cree futility. When you have scratched and crawled a tenth of an jinch at a time to build an empire, it takes a lot gut of you to see it crash.") got to a specific trouble spot only once, "When you throw the game away like we did today by losing the ball 10 times," Munn said, "it's terrible... just terrible."

What Detroit News reporter Pete Waldmeir said in his story Sunday was that Munn was "leveling a backhanded slap at both Head Coach Duffy Daugherty and his team." What he implied was that Munn might be hunting for a new coach.

THE FIRST TWO setbacks of the season were taken in stride by Spartan followers. But the string of losses has started them talking. In a straw vote, we think Daugherty would find most fans backing him, partly because of his personal popularity, mostly because of his past record.

In the four previous seasons State prospered under the

coaching of Daugherty after a slow starting first season. Duffy's first year at the helm brought three wins and six

No blasts or denunciations were made, Optimistic Spartan followers looked toward the next season, 1955, when MSU, though failing to win the Big 10 title, made its second trip to the West Coast in three years.

The following two seasons Daugherty directed the Spartans to 7-2 and 8-1 records. Last winter he was offered an unbelievable price to leave MSU and coach for Texas A&M.

EVERYBODY, INCLUDING some of Daugherty's assistants, looked twice at the offer Daugherty finally refused, and several long range planners probably looked for a new coach from the ranks. This kind of prophesying reportedly led to dissension among some of the coaches.

The dissension among fans has come almost exclusively from this year's showing, in the season's opener State

But State's Big 10 tilts concluded Saturday with five straight defeats, two by shutouts, and a loss to Minnesota by the worst margin of defeat since 1947, when State los to Michigan, 55-0.

A LOSING SEASON burts. President John Hannab, at one campus meeting, said MSU is suffering from too much success in football and it would do students good to experience a losing year. Munn said that a team can't perform miracles all the time.

But Munn wa obviously dissatisfied with the way things were running Saturday. And with football the interesting game that it is, the public would like to see just who dislikes who, and for what reason



Farmers Too Tied-Down

'Cow Sitters' Needed By Michigan Dairymen

A new dairy farm profession is needed in Michigan. It's that of a "sow sitter"

Like parents who want to get away from the children occasionally, dairy farmers want to take a breather from that twice-a-day, every-day-in-the-year job of milking.

According to Donald Murray, extension dairy specialist at MSU, most dairy farms in the state are one-man operations plus some family assistance. This means that the farmer must be there for every milking. Many farmers have called ting tied-down situation a real drudgery in dairy farming.

"For instance," says Murray, "one dairyman just pointed out to me that he hadn't missed a milking in 12 years and he would like to arrange for an occasional weekend off or a week's vacation once in a while—a coad thing for both he and his family."
