Wayne-M Merger **Evokes Speculation**

ALTHOUGH NEWS has been slim, rumor is rampant about the proposed Wayne State-University of Michigan merger and its possible effect on MSU.

According to a local columnist, most of the interests which could determine the outcome of the merger are veilof with political party overtones and even inklings of labor

Perhaps the only possible concern the merger could have with MSU is the suggestion that a Wayne-U of M com-bination might place the East Lansing school in an inferior bursement of funds. So far the MSU administration is Bon-committal in ignoring the merger chances.

THE 12-MEMBER Wayne governing board will cease to be June 80, and the state will assume control of the former municipal institution. The merger idea came into view two weeks ago when Wayne President Dr. Clarence Hilberry proposed the plan to his governing board as being to the University's advantage to be under control of the U of M Board of Regents.

Theorists say an April election, now scheduled, would robably put Wayne under Democratic control. The present or of M Board of Regents is evenly divided with four Republicans and four Democrats. This would at least leave ome of the control of the university in GOP hands.

More rumors say the Democrats might possibly select

candidates, unless the election were cancelled, who may be favorable to Walter Reuther's UAW union. This could bring legislative disfavor from the right-wingers when appropriations time rolls around.

REPORTS TERM union members as being unhappy

about the merger idea and inclined to attempt blocking it Unions have an interest in Wayne because the university is in close proximity to a heavy union population, served by special conferences and classes. Wayne also owns a station donated by the auto worker's union.

With no solution to the merger problem in sight, and the candle burning seemingly at both ends, it will be interesting to see how the politicians unravel this one, and how much influence outside interests have when a settlement story hits the front pages and the public view

"WHY THEN SACRIFICE three years and two summers to the USMC when, with a little effort and information, it is possible to fulfill a military obligation in less than a year, with a reserve commitment which can be waived for men that are entering critical-skills occupations in fields of Chemistry, Physics, Geology and Foreign Landuages? It is possible to enroll in the Reserve Forces Act of 1935 six months 'program in a rural area where there is no filled quota of reservists, go on active duty after graduation, and go to work with no reserve commitment except in case of war, when all reservists are called by act of Congress. The military obligation can be fulfilled more easily than by a three-year bitch with the Marine Corps. A contribution to the security of our country can better be made in a research lab than by participation in obsolete field maneuvers at some obscure military outpost."





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Two Profs Favor Red China in UN

Two MSU professors were on the record Sunday in favor of recognition of Red China and its admission to the United Nations.

Appearing on Viewpoint over Advertisers WKAR-radio, Dr. Lawrence Bat-distini, author of a forthcoming book, "The Rise of American Influence in Asia and the Pacifio," and Dr. Robin Drews, assist-ent professor of foreign studies, called for a change in our atti-side toward Communist China. Both professor cited the fact that we have feeognized other dictatorial governments in the

Dr. Drews said recognition means that we can observe at first hand what is going on in China. Admission to the UN would also make her more responsive to world opinion, he dided.

Admitting that the roturn of Ded China to a more normal pediens in repugnant to the non-summent West, he said that it colves nothing to refuse to recignise the facts.

"No one can say that the generican people owe Chang Kai-shek much more support after the hundreds of millions spent and being spent in holstoring his decadent regime. Adding our ineptiess to this will obt change the situation in our favor."
