Egypt Failed by U. S. EGYPT, an oppressed country from the time of the

Pharaohs, until Nasser's revolution in 1952, has been failed by the United States.

Louis Greiss, a Cairo newspaperman, in a talk Tuesday night told how U.S. foreign policy forced Exyptians, under Nasser, to accept Russia's aid in building the Aswan High Dam, a project which would create two million more fertile acres for Egypt.

According to Greiss, U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles turned the Egyptian people against our country. In 1953 Dulles came to Egypt and promised U.S. aid on the Aswan Dam to combat communism and industrialize that country, In 1953-4-5 Egypt's cotton was unsold, Nasser and the country were sorely in need of financial aid, and the U.S. would not help because of Nasser's unwillingness to sign any of the numerous pacts, such as the Baghdad Pact, which offered only military assistance, not economic aid which was needed.

GREISS SAID Nasser accepted Russian dam aid in desperation, and, "If Russia hadn't been on the scene Nasser would have signed a thousand pacts." Egypt has had enough of ties with the West, the newsman stated, having been under European control for 150 years. Also, a visible example of the results of Western pacts is shown by the sad state of Turkey, suffering because pacts give only armaments, not food and clothing or economic aid,

Nasser, attending the Afro-Asian Conference in 1954, was told by the other countries of the Middle East to note the U.S. unfaithfulness. "Are U.S. promises fulfilled?" they asked. "Or are you afraid Britain won't buy your cotton if you do not co-operate with the West?" So Nasser, faced with the problem of a fading economy and unsold cotton, accepted Russian aid which in turn led to aid in

WHEN ASKED if this dam aid would help to convert Egypt's peoples to a communist inclined way of life he answered, "Not necessarily, but when the people travel by the dam and they point to it and say, 'Look, that's what the Russians built,' they can't help but be influenced."

Why wasn't U.S. aid offered? The Egyptian version of the story goes like this: The US gave no help on the Aswan cause, 1-They wanted to test the new man (Nasser), 2—He (Nasser) shouldn't tell us what to do, 3—If he wants help-let him sign the pacts.

And why are the Egyptians against Dulles and his polioles? Well, an old Egyptian proverb, held nearly sacred by the people, goes like this, "A man is tied by what he says."

Signals Without Power Source

Innovation Sighted in Radio

The possibility of a radio station which would continue to proadcast after losing its electrical power source is being explored at MSU.

Dr. Charles Wells, professor of mathematics, and Dr Alfred Leilner, associate professor of bysics, are working on the project under a grant from the U.S. Army Ordnance Research office. Their problem is not one of design but of power mathematics—of calculating how a certain size and type of antenna would perform under given conditions. Solution would permit engineers to do the design work. It might even make it possible to design a satellite that would proadcast after its betteries had gone dead.

If an antenna were broadcast-

gone dead.

If an antenna were broadcasting on exactly the right frequency for its size, believe Wells and Leitner, it would continue to broadcast after losing its power source.

"To use a poor shalogy," Wells explained, "it would be remotely similar to a pendulum continuing to awing for a short time after the force that started it is removed. In this case, the antenna would continue to op-







Green: Cage Success

"I've never seen anything like that (John) Green," Onio State's Coach Frank Taylor comment-ed after Monday night's MSU victory. "We had the bigger men, but they're too slow. Green can go up and down twice while our men are trying to get up one."

once."
Certainly, Taylor isn't alone
in his evaluation of MSU's great
jumping star. Since starting his
collegiate career in 1957, Green
has been a constant headache
for rival Big 10 coaches, for
that matter, the nation's top cage
powers.

This is quite an achievement for a player who had no formal high school basketball indoctri-

ity. His most valuable asset was the uncanny ability to leap higher than the backboards. He only needed a coach who could

He was a 20-year-old Marine stationed at Atougi Air Base in Japan when the ceach of the base team invited him out for the squad. This was John's first affiliation with an organized

After enrolling at MSU, Green was still unfamiliar with the intricate patterns, and he lacked essential court "savvy" and "sense."

But the humble Green had the desire to learn and spend long hours on polishing his movements and shooting.

As Coach Forddy Anderson put it this way: "When Green came to us he was the rawest material you ever saw. He never had played basketball in high school and looked like it. His first year was his beginner's experience. His second year you might say he was in a transition stage, but learning rapidly. This year he has fully realized his full college potential."

Although John is already

Although John is siready hailed as the greatest player in MSU cage history, he medestly equates his rice to stardom as eteam effort and the excellent coaching he has received.

Green has played a prominent role in State's orbiting into the national basketball picture. His unbelievable jumping ability and elusive reactions have been a center attraction, which Anderson contends is needed to sell the fans.

As a "green" sophomore the 6-5 center compiled an outstanding record in 18 games. John recorded 262 rebounds, 27 in one game. He scored 238 points to rang fourth on the team.

At the conclusion of the championship season he started to receive the first of many individual laurels which would later come his way.

Green was selected to the

Green was selected to the first seam chosen at the NCAA championship round at Kansas City. He landed a berth on the AP third team All-American

Last season Green continued his steady climb to basketball greatness. In the process he established two Big 10 records, He totaled 397 points in 22 games, and paced the confer-

ence's rebounders with 392 recoveries—29 against Washington university. Green's phenomenal field goal shooting percentage of 1.538 shattered Indiana's Dick Neal's average of 5.12.

For his work, John was a first team All-Big 10 selection by AP and UPI polls. He was also voted to the second-team All-Marerica.




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Piston Rally Fails to Win

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
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

Mikoyan and his party of five, including his son Serge, spent an unscheduled night at this U. S. Naval Air Base. The SAS pilot was forced to land because of mechanical trouble in one engine and fire in another.

Mikoyan said he was unshak-en by the trouble on the four-engine plane—though it caused nervous chills in world capitals.
